Father Robert Irwin



On Sunday, June 18th a celebration of Faith, *Christ's Presence in Our Midst*, was held in St Louise Parish Hall. It was also an opportunity for the parish to say Farewell to Father Irwin who has been transferred. Father was Pastor of St Louise de Marillac Church for the past three years.

On October 26, 2003, Father evacuated with the rest of us. While in a motel in El Cajon, he was busy on his phone arranging for emergency relief services for the community.

On Monday, the 27th, he tried three times to get up the Hill. On Tuesday the 28th, he walked up the hill to find the church and rectory badly damaged by the fire, and a small fire in the church.

By Tuesday afternoon, a relief center was established in the parish hall; food, water and other supplies arrived. By Wednesday there were 3 free meals a day available to the community as well as clothing, counseling, and other relief items. Crest owes a big THANK YOU to Father for

starting the relief effort.

Besides being pastor here, Father held a full time job with the Diocese of San Diego as a judge on the Diocesan Tribunal.

Father was an ardent supporter of *The Crest Sun* and eagerly awaited the new issues, distributing them to his neighbors and making them available to parishioners.

He will be missed, but we wish him well as he becomes Pastor of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Church in San Diego.

ALVARADO HOSPITAL MUST REMAIN ACUTE CARE FACILITY

Jacob calls on Tenet officials to ensure that hospital doors, emergency room stay open .

La Mesa, CA- The closure of Alvarado Hospital would jeopardize the health and safety of thousands of San Diego County residents, Supervisor Dianne Jacob warned in a letter to Tenet Healthcare Corp. The Dallas-based company is making plans to close or sell the facility under terms of a legal settlement reached with federal prosecutors. Jacob is adamant that the hospital, one of only two in East County, remains open and continues to provide acute care. She is urging Tenet officials to honor those conditions as part of any future agreement to sell the facility.

"The closure of Alvarado would be disastrous," Jacob wrote in a letter dated May 24, 2006. "I implore you to put the interests of the residents first, the people who depend on this hospital in life or death situations," she wrote.

Jacob's letter included a list of negative impacts to the community should the facility close:

Reduced access to care for uninsured and indigent patients in an are where there is no public hospital

Elimination of a dedicated 24-hour emergency department for stroke patients Loss of one of the most comprehensive rehabilitation programs in the region Loss of 20 ventilator beds- 50% of available beds in East County in the event of a pandemic flu outbreak

Closure of a cardiac program that has received Center of Excellence designation by United Health Care as well as a Bariatric Surgery Center of Excellence, as designated by Blue Cross, Health Net, Aetna and United Resources Network

Loss of one of the only skull-based surgical centers in the nation Elimination of approximately 1,000 jobs with a salary contribution of more than \$70 million to the local economy, and the loss of more than \$5.7 million in tax revenue. Alvarado Hospital serves residents of ten distinct communities in San Diego and Imperial counties. Its programs include cardiac services, emergency medicine, general surgical services, neuroscience, orthopedics, oncology, rehabilitation, skull base surgery, surgical weight reduction and vascular services. There are 500 physicians affiliated with the hospital.

Critters in Crest Lady Bugs By Shelton Stanley

Lady bugs are also known as Lady Bird Beetles. They are, in fact, beetles and beloved by children and by us that need them to rid us of aphids, scale, mites and other sucking insects that harm our treasured plants and trees. The larvae also feed on these pests. Both can consume up to 50 aphids and other bugs a day!

We have an abundance of both the adults and larvae in and around our yard right now. A bunch of the larvae were crawling all over the concrete out back near plants where they were probably hatched. We stepped on several before noticing them. I'm not sure why they weren't on the plants, chowing down, but there they were. One time, while watching them, I observed a smaller one appear to attack a larger one. They struggled for many seconds until it looked like the larger one bit the smaller one and it limped off bleeding. I had to stop watching and go do something else, at my wife's bidding, so don't know if it died or survived. None of the other larvae were paying attention to each other. They were just wandering around on the concrete. Perhaps this was an anomaly?

Lady bug females only lay eggs where there is ample food available. The larvae hatch after about a week. Eggs are laid in clusters of ten to 50, often on the undersides of leaves. The eggs are yellow and spindle shaped. The larvae are black or grey with six orange or white spots on their backs. They molt three or four times before pupating. The pupa is dark gray and orange or black and orange. When the new adults emerge, the wing covers are yellow until they harden. That's why I've seen lady bugs with red, orange and yellow wing covers! I learned something researching this article!

The adult lady bug is nearly a perfect elongated half sphere with the head pointed downward and they have short legs. The most common lady bug has six black spots on each wing cover. (There is also a two spotted lady bug.) Family *Coccinellidae*; Order, *Coleoptera*; Class, *Insecta*. As an aside- my bug book, "A Field Guide to Insects" by Donald J. Borror and Richard *E. White*, there is a color plate showing the six black spots on each wing cover, but the black and white picture on a different page shows five larger spots and one has half on each wing cover. There are a lot of other lady bird beetles around, but they don't all eat our plant eating pests. Some eat the plants! These are drawings, not photos. This book was copyrighted in 1970! I'd buy a more up-to-date bug book, but we have the Internet now! It turns out that there are other lady bugs with different spot patterns on their backs. Lady bugs find their food on plants and shrubs like rose bushes, oleander (strange, since the oleander is poisonous to humans and other mammals), milkweed, and your food garden plants like broccoli. I have also personally observed them on almost all of the weeds in and around my yard, like dandelions.

As a child, when my siblings and I played with lady bugs, we would sing a song: "Lady bug, lady bug, fly away, your house is on fire..." and I don't think we ever did know all of the words. I did find a rhyme on the Internet though: "Ladybird, ladybird, fly away home, Your house is on fire and your children are all gone..." I don't think that one is complete either.

We noticed too, that sometimes they would spit or secrete something on us when we played with them for too long. It turns out that they do this in self defense. It's a bad tasting (to birds) fluid that they can secrete from the joints in their legs. They were probably trying to tell us to leave them alone and let them go. Adult lady bugs also don't taste good to birds, so if birds try to eat them, they aren't ingested. They spit them out, that is, if birds can spit. I would imagine, though, that any attempt to eat them would result in a major fatal injury to the lady bug.

This is what the larvae looks like, but less than 1/4 inch long before pupating. I'm sure everyone knows what the adults look like. If you have any questions, just ask. Address them to the editor, Betty Lucas. She will pass them on.

Random Thoughts by Millie Colburn Walker

Getting used to being taken care of isn't all that easy. As you know I fell at work and sustained a break to my pelvis and femur. This has been the worst injury I have ever had and hope it is the last injury of it's kind I will ever have. The recuperation time has been filled with a lot of whining, moaning and groaning. I am surprised to find my daughter is still here every morning. She waits on me, climbing the stairs whenever I ring the bell she hooked up and answering the telephone when I call her on the house phone using my cell phone. As my ability to move around improves her chores become fewer but still she stands by me taking care of any needs I can not do and even, bless her heart, some I can but not so well. I was beginning to be able to ask for more without feeling guilty and she was right there helping me, serving me and only whining a bit herself. Then came the annual Sisters/Cousins trip to one of my sisters family cabin in Big Bear. In this cabin there is a dorm room upstairs with six twin beds and two bedrooms downstairs, one of which my sister, the hostess, sleeps in and one with a queen size bed that goes to whoever is older or unable to easily climb stairs. Well this year one of the cousins asked for the downstairs room and when we all had arrived she was asked if she would allow me, the youngest in the group, to have it since I was having such a problem getting around.

She did and it was heavenly. I haven't slept in a queen size bed in a long time, and it felt luxurious. I could even read late without bothering anyone else and if I can't sleep, that is what I do. Everyone helped me. They carried my bowl of cereal to the table, they brought my plate, my glass, anything I needed. I got to sit in the front seat of the car when we went into town. Now don't get me wrong but I could get used to being waited on by others like this, only without the pain. The trade-off isn't worth the agony.

I used to climb the stairs with little effort now I have to make sure my cane is well placed on the step. I used to crawl into bed but now I have to sit on the bed and scootch myself to the middle. I used to sleep on one side then turn often in the night now it's on my back or the side of my non-broken leg. I can't climb up anything, like into the top of my closet to pull down boxes of scarves, shoelaces, tissues, etc.

It's not easy remembering to not turn my leg out until the pain reminds me. The doctor tells me this will pass and one day I will be as good as I was before. Part of me wants it to be after next year's trip to Big Bear since I am the youngest and probably the only way I'll ever get that room again is to still be using the cane, but the other part of me (the one with the brain) wants this over ASAP and I will gladly sleep in the dorm, tossing and turning and not being able to turn on the light to read until three in the morning because I can't sleep.
