Free Shade Trees

From the Center for Sustainable Energy

It's a pleasantly shady deal from the California Center for Sustainable Energy. They are giving away over 14,000 trees to San Diego county residents, K-12 schools, public agencies and non-profits. Full sized, 15-gallon, nursery-quality specimens available in a choice of 20 varieties.

Why? Trees create shade, save energy and help cool homes by allowing homeowners to use less air conditioning in the summer and stay warmer in the winter. Shade trees enhance neighborhood appearances, increase property values, reduce storm runoff and improve air quality, too.

To participate, you must complete and submit a completed Application Form and Participant Agreement, attend a 90 minute tree planting workshop, pledge to take good care of your trees, and the trees are yours. Classes are conducted on private property at a participant's home. Coastal residents of San Diego County and homes built after 1994 are **no longer eligible** for free trees. The program runs through December 2008.

Keys to Growing a Healthy and Beautiful Shade Tree

Do's

- If a young tree's lower branches (along the trunk grow too long, cut them to 4-5inches, but avoid cutting down to the trunk.
- Once a tree passes the tree-year mark, prune in the winter when most trees are dormant.
- Prune before the tree puts out any new spring growth
- After three years, prune the lower limbs to approximately one foot off ground level. If you want to walk under your tree canopy, continue to remove the lower limbs one foot off the ground each year for up to six years.
- Keep the planting area (4 feet in diameter) clear of weeds, grass and other plant life. Competition from other plants inhibits young tree growth.
- Use a pair of gardening gloves and pull weeds by hand or better yet mulch! Apply wood chips or other organic mulch 6 inches deep around the base of your tree (but 4" away from the trunk) to cool soil, control weeds and reduce moisture evaporation)
- Water deeply (15 gallons a week) when the temperature is below 90 degrees. (30-40 galls if temperature climbs to 100 degrees) Adjust watering with weather and seasons.

Please Don't.....

- Prune a young tree for the first three years following planting; trees grow faster and stronger when more foliage remains.
- Apply wound dressings to pruning cuts.
- Remove lower branches until the tree reaches at least three years of age; this will help the tree grow more vigorously and protect the trunk from sunburn.
- Remove more than 25% of the leaves and branches (canopy)
- Branches should not have cuts over one inch in diameter. Disease or broken branches may require larger cuts.
- Top your tree!
- Use a lawn mower or weed trimmer within this area
- Over water
- Use sprinklers. Sprinklers are not adequate to allow the water to go deep enough to moisten your tree roots.
- Mulch with rock or gravel as rocks don't provide the proper insulation to tree roots that mulch provides
- Use black plastic since tree roots need to breathe.

Stay-Cationing in San Diego County

San Diego County is a favorite vacation spot for millions of tourists. With outrageous gas prices and inflation, many folks are staying home this summer. Why not take advantage of San Diego's many tourist bargains. Here are 10 ways to be a tourist in San Diego.

1. A Trolley Ride to Major San Diego Attractions – Cost \$5 or under per person for the entire day!!!

Take the trolley and visit some of San Diego's favorite tourist locations. For the Trolley Schedule, go to: http://www.sdmts.com/Trolley/Trolley.asp#schedule



The Cost for a full day's entertainment? A One-Day tripper unlimited travel pass is \$5.00. Trolleys run every 20-30 minutes so you can hop on and off as you choose. There are less expensive options for senior, disabled and short term trips (2 hour time duration from purchase time). Go to http://www.sdmts.com/fares.asp#frf for more information.

Family Weekends: Every Saturday & Sunday, two children 12 and under ride free with any paying passenger 18 and over.

Editor's Recommendation:

Spend a day taking the trolley on the Green, Blue, and Orange Lines. If you end at Petco Park, take in a Padres Baseball game. Start out early since there is so much to explore:

Green line from El Cajon to old town. Stop to explore:

- SDSU College
- Mission San Diego
- Mission Valley Center
- Hazard Center
- Fashion Valley
- Old Town

Transfer to the Blue Line in Old Town and stop to explore:

- Little Italy
- Santa Fe Depot
- Fifth Avenue (Gas Lamp)
 At this point you can walk to
 Petco or you can transfer on
 the Orange line at Fifth
 Avenue and visit:
- Seaport Village
- Gaslamp Quarter
- Petco Park

2. You made it to the Petco Park on the Trolley- It's Padre Time.

You don't have to pay a fortune to go to a baseball game in San Diego. If you want to bring a blanket or lawn chair, you can watch the game from the park area for \$5 (\$7 day of game) or sit in the bleachers for \$10 (\$9 advanced purchase). Go to http://sandiego.padres.mlb.com to view a copy of the schedule and promotional dates.

3. Frisbee Golf – Balboa Park at Morley Field (Pershing Dr & Redwood Street), San Diego Cost: Greens fees at Morley Field are \$3.00 weekends and holidays, \$2.50 weekdays plus disc rentals (\$1.50 each or bring your own frisbee) 619-692-3607

While Balboa Park's is primarily known for its museum district and the zoo, the lesser-known disc golf course is popular among young and young-at-heart San Diegans as a great low-budget way to savor a sunny day. The game is simple, consisting of throwing a Frisbee-like disc at 19 scattered targets. But the obstacles – trees, hills, other players – between thrower and target make it interesting. The course stretches over a hilly, tree-covered corner of Balboa Park called Morley Field. More than 300 people find their way there on each weekend day. Week days are less crowded for those that can manage a day off. No experience needed. Round out the bargain, by buying an ice cream sandwich for \$1 or a corn dog for \$1.50.

4. Free Fly Casting Lessons – Lake Murray – Sunday 9AM through noon.

San Diego Fly Fishers (SDFF) offers free flycasting lessons at Lake Murray. You can use your own equipment or borrow club equipment from one of the certified instructors. SDFF is very proud that it is one of the few clubs in the country that offers this service free to the general public

5. U.S. Open Sandcastle Competition in Imperial Beach Pier – July 19-21

Hundreds of sand sculpting artists from around the country gather at the seashore to create magnificent works of art using only sand and water. The event also features a parade, children's sandcastle contest and fireworks display. July 19-21 at the Imperial Beach Pier.

The Garden Club met in June at the lovely home of resident, Judy Dunning. Judy has been active in the San Diego Herb Society, and has had quite an herb garden in the past. Unfortunately, she lost her home to the Cedar Fire, but has rebuilt something very special. She shares with us her recipe for Lavender Lemonade, which I have tried. It is truly delicious. This is a great summer cooler.

Lavender Lemonade

Steep 1/2 cup of lavender* in 1 qt of boiling water for 5 minutes. Strain and use the liquid to make up part of the water for 1 gallon of reconstituted frozen lemonade. You can also do this with rosemary.

***If you want to use lavender or rosemary from your garden then you can harvest any kind of rosemary but use Sweet or Provence lavender. Let it dry by putting paper towels on a cookie sheet and spread the lavender flowerheads, or rosemary leaves on the sheet, cover with another paper towel and let it dry. You should be able to use them the next day.

Editor's note: This recipe also works with fresh squeezed lemonade. Just substitute part of the water for the herb liquid.

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Critters in Crest Beetles

There are so many beetles, I couldn't possibly write about all of them found in Crest, so I will concentrate on just two that I have seen around our house every year we've lived here.

The first is the Stinkbug or Stink Beetle. It is also called Clown Beetle because of the way it stands on its head and sticks its rear end up in the air when disturbed. They are also known as "darkling" or "pinacate" beetles of the genus *Eleodes*.

These beetles are most active during the night, but can often be seen at all times of the day, patrolling at random for food, which they locate by smell. They primarily eat detritus of grasses and forbs (in other words: decaying and rotting grasses and plants, and fungus).



Pinacates are shiny black with a pointed abdomen and look like a hot rod with a raised rear end and lowered front end when walking. There are about

120 species in the western United States and in size they range from 0.4 to 1.4 inches long.

Contrary to common belief, they do not spray a cloud of foul smelling toxic vapor when they stand on their head. That trick belongs to the Bombardier Beetle of the genus *Brachinus*. The stinkbug, however, can secrete a foul smelling liquid or spray that does not wash off and can hurt if it gets in your eyes or mouth. There are other beetles also called Stinkbugs, but they look entirely different than the one pictured here.

These Stinkbugs make good pets. They will eat apples, lettuce and dog food in captivity.

The other beetle I see a lot of here in Crest is the Ironclad Beetle, *Phloeodes Pustulosis*.

One of my first encounters with this bug was when I accidentally stepped on one and thought it



was a pebble. Nothing happened, as in, it didn't get squashed or crushed. This is because its carapace, (exoskeleton) including the elytra (the wing covers) is extremely hard (thus the name Ironclad?)

This bug is usually ¾ of an inch long as an adult. There are other Ironclad beetles too, one that looks similar to this one, the Diabolical Ironclad, and one that ranges through Texas and Mexico that is white and black and looks entirely different. (Live jewelry in Mexico!)

The Ironclad beetle doesn't have any wings, so the elytra are fused in the middle where they would normally open on other beetles that fly. (The Stink Beetle has delicate wings under its elytra, but doesn't use them and therefore doesn't fly either.)

This critter feeds on fungus on rotting wood, and on detritus. I see them in our carport and all around the house and yard, and by the time I see one, it seems to be disturbed and is playing dead. When they play dead, they pull their legs in towards their body and can remain immobile for long periods of time. They look dead.

Recently, I caught one (just saw one and picked it up) and put it into a sandwich-sized zip-lock bag, having this article in mind. It survived being in that closed bag for a week before I started seriously researching it to write about it *here*. After learning about it, I was thinking about keeping it and feeding it, but I changed my mind and let it go. What would I do with it?

These beetles are harmless and make good pets. They eat carrots and oatmeal in captivity... (and they sell huge millipedes as pets at Petco?)! I guess watching insects is at least as entertaining as watching fish in an aquarium...?

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East County Fire Protection District Consolidates with San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection District

Created in 1994 to better serve two distinct areas of East County residential/business, the East Count Fire Protection District (ECFPD) has become a model for consolidation of fire departments in California.

What happened? A cash strapped fire protection district struggling to provide service year after year on an incredibly under funded budget, dependent on the good will of its citizens, the extraordinary efforts of under paid fire fighters, and local, state and federal grant funding, faced staff reductions and possible closure of the Crest station. A recent election seated three new board members. Infused with community activism and spirit, rallying anyone who would listen, drastically reducing a budget already cash poor, the Board took its case to the people.

In an overwhelming show of support with a super majority, the community authorized sufficient funding to operate both fire stations in the near term and to avoid drastic fire service reductions. Faced with past and current SD County consolidation efforts, sorely under funded by County government, administrative staff departing for greener pastures, and a previously ordered fire engine that couldn't be paid for without County assistance, the Board looked for partnership with a more stable fire fighting entity. Proposals went to Lakeside, El Cajon, Alpine and San Miguel Fire Protection Districts. Tirelessly, Kandhy Franklin and Dawn Hubert representing a Board subcommittee, completed the search for a partner after numerous meetings, discussions, financial and operations analyses. The full Board held numerous community meetings to inform apprehensive citizens. In the end, the move to consolidate with perhaps the finest most stable fire department in the County, San Miguel FPD was chosen.

The last general meeting, held in June, and a special meeting held thereafter for discussion of labor relations issues, signals the end of the East County Fire Protection District and its Board of Directors. It is not often that an elected Board willingly votes itself out of existence, putting personal agenda aside. The Board is convinced it made the right decision. The community should be proud to become a part of the San Miguel Fire Protection District with its comprehensive operations, advanced training, long term financial stability, and high profile leadership in the County of San Diego.

Crestridge is Setting for Students Helping Students

On Monday, June 2, 2008, twenty-five 5th grade students from Crest Elementary hosted 70 fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students from Potrero Elementary School at Crestridge. The Crest students, survivors of the Cedar Fire in 2003 wanted to share what they had learned and inspire hopefulness in the Potrero students, survivors of the Harris Fire in 2007.

The Crest students are part of EDI's Ecology Kids Serve (EKS) program with the Cajon Valley Union School District. This event was part of the service-learning project that all EKS students do. Each

participating class learns science-related curriculum in the classroom, visits the Reserve for further hands-on learning, then identifies and completes a project that benefits their school or community while integrating the science they've learned. Crest students wanted to help another community who had been through a fire disaster.

Dianne Jacob Speaks Out On The Proposed Placement of Sexually Violent Predators in Jacumba

I adamantly oppose the placement of Sexually Violent Predators in Jacumba— or any place else in our region. I continue to question the wisdom of State mental health experts who have concluded that these individuals are safe for return to society. I view the release of anyone classified as a Sexually Violent Predator as a reckless and

unjust gamble with the safety of the public. Our region has already been subjected to the doomed release of Sexually Violent Predators Douglas Badger and Matthew Hedge. Both are back in State custody. It is my very strong belief that the State is asking for a repeat of that failed experiment. I once again implore the State legislature to ensure that individuals classified as Sexually Violent Predators remain institutionalized in perpetuity. If the law requires them be placed somewhere, the only appropriate location would be in a trailer on the grounds of Donovan State Prison, where sexually violent predators have been previously placed because of its isolation from neighborhoods and sufficient proximity to social services and law enforcement. With no access to public transportation, Jacumba is too far from the social service programs these offenders are required to use. The public is placed at an even greater risk because of the offenders' need to travel.

Naturally Wonderful: Baking Soda

It amazes me how the simplest of products have a multitude of uses. But here is one of the little miracle products that is far underrated. It is a natural, environmentally friendly product that will not harm you or your family. While baking soda is most commonly used in your kitchen, you might be surprised of its versatility.

It's a cooking ingredient:

Of course, its number one use is baking. But did you know about its other uses for cooking? Out of baking power? Make your own with 2 parts cream of tartar to 1 part baking soda and 1 part corn starch; Add to water when soaking dried beans to make them more digestible, Add to water to remove the "gamey" taste from wild game; Wash your vegetables with soda before cooking to remove chemicals and pesticides.

Medicinal Purposes: Brush your teeth or gargle to freshen your breath and relieve canker sore pain.; Apply to insect bites., rashes, poison ivy, and sunburns, windburns, by making a paste and applying; Put in baby's bath water to relieve diaper rash; Take 1/2 tsp of baking soda in ½ glass of water to relieve acid indigestion or heartburn; a soda bath relieves general skin irritations.;

Personal Cleanliness: Give yourself a facial; condition your hair (2 T soda and 1 tsp shampoo will remove buildup);

Its a deodorizer: Put it in your refrigerator, your coffee maker (not aluminum), your dishwasher, your garbage cans, your kitty litter box (sprinkle on bottom before adding kitty litter); Sprinkle in tennis shoes, socks to eliminate order; use it as an underarm deodorant; Sprinkle on your carpets; sprinkle on your animals between baths:

It's a Cleaner: Clean Formica and marble counter tops with baking soda on a damp sponge; .Cleans Vegetables; For a badly-burned pans (sprinkle moisten and soak); Helps wash oil and grease from stained clothing by adding to wash water; soak and wash diapers; Clean baby toys; Clean your refrigerator and freezer; wash food and drink containers with soda and water; polish silverware, silver (without raised patterns); clean your bathroom with dry soda on a moist sponge; Keep drains clean and free flowing by putting 5 T of soda in each week, then flush with hot water;

Miscellaneous Uses:

Neutralizes battery acid;

Smother's flames: Puts out grease and electrical fires, clothing, fuel wood, upholstery and rug fires. Make Play Clay with baking soda: (1 ¼ cups of water, 2 cups of soda, 1 cup cornstarch)

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
