

## Crest's 68<sup>th</sup> Year July 4<sup>th</sup> Event Information

### Road Closures:

THE MAIN ROAD WILL TEMPORARILY BE CLOSED FROM 8:45 TO 10:45 on July 4 for the Crest Parade.. There will be detour signs posted. If there were an emergency and you needed to get in or out the fastest way possible, we will accommodate you. N, Park Blvd (the street where the clubhouse is located), as well as Burdette Way will be closed from 6:00 am to 3:00 pm. The two handicapped spots located on North Park Dr. will be moved to the opposite side of the park.



### Parade Lineup:

The parade will step off at 9:30 this year. If you plan to participate in the parade, get to the park by 8:30 a.m. for lineup. The parade will line up on South Lane. Look for signs for your group either in the park or on the road. The parade steps off on Albatross, turns right on Suncrest Blvd/La Cresta Blvd (passes the library, Crest School, the fire station and Nancy Jane Park), ending one block past the park on Scenic Dr. The detour route is Eucalyptus Drive (dash line is parade route and dotted line is alternate route shown on the right).

The general parade lineup this year is planned as follows: fire engines, medic truck, grand marshals and military, Pots and Pan Band, antique tractors, motorcycles, floats, bicycles, golf carts and rhinos and 3-wheelers or quiet quads, car clubs, lawn chair brigade, more floats, and horses. The parade will be followed by the trailer which will pick up the road barricades. Please enter South Lane by Crest Drive (by the Catholic Church) so you will be facing in the right direction when you arrive. There will be volunteers to help guide you to your places. It is important that we demonstrate that we can monitor ourselves like we have for the past 68 years.

Those wishing to be judged for an award will need to make sure they get there early enough to complete a form giving your entry information so judges know who you are as you pass Nancy Jane Park. Award categories this year include: Best Individual,

Best Group, Best Float, Best Motorized, Best Horse, Best Jeep, Best Off-Road, Best Golf Cart. Funniest/Most Creative, Best Theme, Most Patriotic, Sweepstakes.

**Do you want to participate?** Dress your horse, child, golf cart, pickup truck, or super homemade float in its patriotic best and join in. Haven't you always wanted to march in a parade? Rumor has it that we might see some favorites from the past years, The "The Pots and Pans Band" from Crest Elementary School led by Mrs.

Keffer, one of our Grand Marshals will be in attendance. Another favorite. "The Ladies Lawn Chair Brigade of Crest" hope to make a great come back if they can find enough "vintage" lawn chairs. A new entry this year is a local Crest motorcycle club, Stray Dogs, who will be riding in the parade, as well as helping with the pre-parade organization. The Patriot Guard Riders, another grand marshal will head up our parade and we invite any military folk to March behind the guard. For more information, email kandhyfranklin@cox.net. The Patriot Guard Riders originated in Mulvane, Kansas in August 2005, at American Legions Riders Post 136. The Patriot Guard Riders stand guard for fallen soldiers of current and past wars who were killed in action or are casualties of war. Invited by the families, the Guard Riders show their deep and sincere respect at special events.. You don't need to ride a motorcycle or be a Veteran to be a part of The Patriot Guard Riders.

**Food:** Food will be sold in the park this year rather than the clubhouse. Burgers, dogs, drinks, snow cones, and other goodies will be available for purchase. Remember the drinking of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in Nancy Jane Park.

Cool Zone: Stop by the clubhouse to see displays by our Historic Society and other organizations..

Games: The Crest PTA is working with the CCA to bring some game booths to the park this year.

**Music:** It promises to be another great year of music with Cathryn Beeks watching over our venue. Music will include the **Cowboy Angels** and more. Performances start at 8:00 a.m.

**Super Raffle/Auction** –Our auction/raffle is once again in the works. It's a great opportunity to support your community and win with some fabulous prizes. So don't forget to bring some money for the raffle.

## Volunteers:

**Fire Prevention Fee due June 14** - Well it's that time of year again. This year there was a \$2.33 increase bringing the total to \$117.33. It is still suggested that the fee be appealed. The process and form to do this can be found at <a href="http://www.calfirefee.com/appeal/">http://www.calfirefee.com/appeal/</a> and checking the "other" box (cite the appeal is based on the fact that the tax is unconstitutional.) This must be done within 30 days of billing date (mine was dated May 14, 2014.) Do not mail the appeal form with your bill but send it to the address on the form. Cal-Fire will reject the appeal filed on these grounds, but the appeal is vital to ensuring you remain eligible for a refund should the lawsuit prevail.

**San Miguel Votes to increase Fire Taxes.** The Prop E tax was once again increased by 3% at the May 14 San Miguel Board Meeting. This 3% will be added on to the \$296.42 2013 parcel rate. The Paramedic Special Benefit Tax will also increase by 1.60% from the \$66.87 per parcel rate. ## **RATTLESNAKE BITES**

This is the time of year when we need to be aware of rattlesnakes in Crest. Here are a few awareness tips:

The Rattlesnake generally is not aggressive, but will strike when threatened or deliberately provoked. Rattlesnakes can cause serious injury to humans. Most bites occur between the months of April and October when snakes and humans are most active outdoors.

**Precautions to lessen the chance of being bitten:** Be aware that startled rattlesnakes may not rattle before striking defensively. Most rattlesnake bites occur when a rattlesnake is accidentally touched or startled. When walking in open areas, stay on well-used trails and avoid tall grass, weeds and heavy underbrush where snakes may hide during the day. Rattlesnakes can be active at night during summer months. They will seek out shady places during the day. Reasonable watchfulness should be sufficient to avoid snake bites. Be especially careful when climbing rocks or around firewood piles. Check out stumps or logs before sitting down and do not reach under rocks, bushes or logs. Do not handle a freshly killed rattlesnake, it can still inject venom.


**What to do in the event of a snake bite:** The first thing to do if bitten is to stay calm. All rattlesnake bites require medical attention. Generally, the most serious effect of a rattlesnake bite to an adult is local tissue damage which needs to be treated. Immobilize the affected area and keep the bite area below the heart. Wash the bite area gently with soap and water and remove watches, rings, etc., which may constrict swelling.

## What can you do to keep your dog safe from being bitten?

1. Get your dog the rattlesnake vaccine – the cost is \$25 compared to anti-venom which can cost between \$500 -\$1000 depending where you live.

2. Keep your dog on a 6 ft. leash.

3. If your dog is bitten by a rattlesnake - If you can, carry your dog to your car. If you can't carry your dog without either of you struggling, walk your dog to your car. Limiting the dog's activity will limit the venom moving around in their body, which is better. THEN GET THEM TO A VET IMMEDIATELY!







### One Call Now: Crest Emergency Call System

The One Call Now Emergency Call System is a service available to Crest residents to receive calls when there is an emergency or evacuation notification. Crest residents are encouraged to sign up and to tell their neighbors about it.

While there is no cost for Crest residents, each time a call is made, it costs approximately \$100. In the past, the CFSC has paid for this service with small grants. Grants are not always available, so we would encourage you to make a donation to the Crest Fire Safe Council which is a 501(c)(3) organization. Your donations are tax deductible. Checks can be sent to Crest Fire Safe Council, 113 N Park Dr. El Cajon 92021.

There have been some questions regarding how this system works. When you get a call, there will be a tone, then an announcement that Crest Fire Safe Council is calling, a slight break, then the message. The caller ID will identify the caller as the Crest Community Clubhouse (442-7378). Note, this is an answering machine number only and messages are picked up every couple days so do not call back this number.

Some people answer so quickly that they interrupt the message and accidently get disconnected. There are also occasional times when the connection causes the line to be garbled. If the call was not clear, you can call toll free 1-877-698-3261 and press button to hear our "latest message." This option is good for 48 hours after message is sent out. You may also use this number to opt out of receiving these calls

It should be noted that Crest Fire Safe Council (CFSC) consists of volunteers who are dedicated to helping this community. They make every effort to be accurate and timely in the information that is sent out. CFSC is not responsible for any decisions you make with the information you are given nor can they guarantee that calls will be delivered with 100% accuracy. Please use this as a tool to help communicate information regarding your community.

Statistically, our last call reached 94% of the numbers. Kathy Fiedor and Debbie Milligan-Fox take the information from the report and research the calls that didn't go all the way through. They do an amazing job, and this procedure of making all these calls takes hours.

Our last fire message dated 5/14/14 went to:

1,478 members, 1,687 phone #'s were called of which 1,582 (94%) were completed.

105 numbers were not reached (phones are disconnected, busy or no answer,)

You can help out by

- 1.) Setting up your answer machine or voice mail to accept these calls
- 2.) Letting CFSC know when to add or remove phone numbers.

To sign up for the One Call emergency 911 system, email Kandhy at <u>kandhyfranklin@cox.net</u> or Kathy at <u>kathyfiedor@gmail.com</u> or leave the information on the 44-CREST (442-7378) with your name (include last name) and phone #'s. Generally, we can input 3 to 4 numbers. If you include your email address, you will receive Crest email notifications.

The mission of the sub-regional planning group is to advise and assist the Director of Planning, the Planning and Environmental Review Board, the Zoning Administrator,

the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors in the preparation, amendment and implementation of community and sub-regional plans.

Meetings are held the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of each month at 7:00 pm. Locations rotate between the Dehesa School, The Crest Community Center, and the Harbison Canyon Community Center. The June 9 meeting will be held at the DEHESA SCHOOL, 4612 Dehesa Road, El Cajon, 92019. The following are excerpts from the April 14<sup>th</sup> minutes.

**G1. Announcements and correspondence.** Mary Manning reported on the 2 April meeting of the Rural Fire Protection District Board, which she attended. She provided Group members with a handout that was prepared for the District Board that reviews the process that governs the potential dissolution of the District, and the process for resolving a protest against dissolution by voters in the District. It will require 2,225 valid signatures from eligible voters of the District to uphold a protest against dissolution, and to cause a special election to decide the matter.

Chairman Wally Riggs reported on his attending a meeting of the County planning staff and Chairs of the Planning Groups. The focus of the meeting was to seek clarification of ambiguities in Policy I-1, by considering changes in Planning Group member eligibility, in public notices of Planning Group meetings, and in the definition of what constitutes the quorum required for a Planning Group meeting. It is estimated that it will be 1 to 2 years before potential changes to Policy I-1 will be ready for consideration by the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Riggs announced that Jack Vandover is moving to Oregon shortly after the July meeting of the Planning Group, and called for getting the word out and advertising in Harbison Canyon for candidates for nomination to Seat 10 after the July meeting. Riggs mentioned that there is also the possibility that Jeff Myrick may leave Seat 12 in the near future.

**G1a.** Speed limit posting on Harbison Canyon Road. Chairman Riggs reported on two recent conference calls he joined, with staff from Department of Public Works and the Traffic Advisory Committee, to discuss future speed limit posting on Harbison Canyon Road. He emphasized that the community is adamantly opposed to a 50 mph speed limit; the Traffic Advisory Committee is willing to propose a 45 mph speed limit all the way along Harbison Canyon Road to its intersection with Dehesa Road.

**G2a.** Expense reimbursement requests. Chairman Wally Riggs requested Planning Group approval for a reimbursement of \$128.00 to him, for his payment of the annual rent for the Group's official mailing address (P.O. Box 21489, El Cajon, CA 92021-1489). Bryan Underwood moved the Group recommends approval of a reimbursement of \$128.00 to Wally Riggs for his payment of the annual rent for the Group's One; 0 abstain).

**G2b. Expense reimbursement requests.** Chairman Riggs informed the Group that the County needs to provide a reimbursement of \$300.00 to the Crest Community Association, to pay for the Planning Group's use of the CCA building for the Group's January, February and April meetings. Bill Bretz moved the Group recommends approval of a reimbursement of \$300.00 to the Crest Community Association, for use of its building for three Planning Group meetings. The motion passed (10 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain).



## The Amazing Ceanothus

Paul Kemp, PhD has taught Biology Department at the University at San Diego since 1997. Paul received an award from the State of California Parks and Recreation to conduct an investigation at Cuyamaca Rancho State Park (CRSP) to assess the contribution of Ceanothus to the soil fertility and nitrogen fixation at the site and recovery of the burned conifer stands at CRSP following the Cedar fire of 2003.

Growing up in Colorado, I often heard the expression "April showers bring May Flowers." I don't know if there is an equivalent expression for the remarkable blooms that brighten up the foothills and mountains of Southern California following winter rains, but much of the color can be attributed to the Ceanothus. This group is well known to horticulturists for the varieties of lilacs that have been derived from various species throughout the U.S. But it is probably less well known in its role as one of the most important native shrubs in the chaparral and woodland communities of California. There are more species of this shrub than any other (55 species, with 15 species in San Diego County,) with several occurring in and around Crest. The most common species in our area is C. oliganthus (hairy leaf ceanothus), which gets its name from the hairs that suddenly become quite prominent once you get the leaf close to your eye. This is the first species to break into a full bloom in our area, with the first ones arriving in January. The flowers are primarily blue, but a rarer white strain of this species gives rise to white and pale blues flowered shrubs

The importance of Ceanothus in the plant communities of California can be attributed to several features. First, virtually all species are well adapted to fire, which is an important force in shaping the fire-prone shrub communities that dominate the chaparral and woodlands of the coastal side of California. Most species are quite capable of resprouting after being burned to the ground. They resprout from a burl that is a nutrient storage structure protected below ground. Species that don't develop this structure are prolific seeders (such as hairy-leaf ceanothus), creating an enormous soil seedbank waiting for a fire to clear out the overstory so they can germinate and grow anew. Hairy leaf ceanothus has a remarkable ability to shoot seeds out of its pods as the temperatures begin to soar in late spring, with each shrub "going off" rather like a tiny popcorn maker. A second feature common to all Ceanothus species (which have been examined), is their ability to form a symbiotic relationship with a nitrogen-fixing bacteria, Frankia. They are among the first species to regrow after a fire (particularly a severe fire). Fires that are severe can burn off the

litter and duff layer on top of the soil (which contain much of the material that will provide soil nutients), and can even, make soils quite nitrogen deficient. Thus, these species are well suited to nitrogen-poor soil, since they can "make" their own nitrogen.

One such example of a remarkable ceanothus response to a forest fire was seen following the Cedar fire of 2003. The Cedar fire was an intense fire as it burned into the mixed conifer forest of Cuyamaca-Rancho State Park, and it killed most trees as well as understory plants. In the first couple of years following the fire and normal succession of species began to occur, including herbaceous plants and small shrubs, many known to be adapted to growing after fires in Southern California. By the third year following the fire the shrub Ceanothus palmeri was found to be growing abundantly in the Park, especially in the parts that were severely burned. The species was not common in the Park prior to the fire, but was an occasional species of surrounding mountains. By 2008 it was forming dense stands in the Park that had eliminated nearly all other species and was growing over trails and fire roads. Since that time the Park and fire management groups have explored ways to thin this species so that the forest succession might get back "on track" with the growth of tree seedlings of species of the previous forest, such various pines, white fir, and incense cedar. Presently, these seedlings are not able to growing under the dense ceanothus canopy. Question that remains to be answered regarding what is happening in the Park are: 1) why did Ceanothus palmeri become so dominant so guickly, 2) is it important in restoring nitrogen to the soils, or is it just optimally adapted to this severely burned area, and 3) will the persistence of this shrub create a new chaparral-type of community in the areas that were once a forest (a distinct possibility given that the shrub community will create an enormous amount of above ground stem wood (fuel) over the next decade or two, making the area very fire prone, which, if it occurs, would likely restart a cycle of ceanothus regrowth.
