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## Silent Movies and Theater Organs

Around the 1920's the moving picture industry evolved, introducing many great stars and technology. The main problem was that the movies were silent. This was solved by using music by instruments and/or orchestras to aid the presentation of the film. Pianos, organs, and bands were used. This required many sounds to be added to assist the movie makers. People composed music that could be performed while the movie was being shown. The only music that evolved was the pipe organ and this was changed into what was called the theater organ. The theatre organ is in essence a pipe organ with many additions such as train whistle, horns, and other sounds to enhance the movie presentation. The artist playing the music was especially trained so the music would correspond to what was being shown on screen.

Through the efforts of the Theater Organ Society of San Diego (TOSSD), all of this is once again available. The organization has the theater organ, musicians, people to tune and repair the organ, and other people to show the silent movie. Even a fund is set up to provide scholarships to deserving students. TOSSD fortunately was able to find a place to house the theater organ which requires a lot of room for all the pipes, etc. The Trinity Church on 3902 Kenwood Drive in Spring Valley has met the challenge for the organ and the seating.

The Theatre Organ Society of San Diego is offering an Organ Concert Series on the Mighty Wurlitzer organ at Trinity Church. The upcoming concert series is as follows:

Congratulations to our Crest Fire Safe Council. They have been awarded \$208,010 for fuel reduction for 150 acres in Crest. The awards ceremony was held April 25 at Kit Carson Park in Escondido. The project has been structured to address fuel loads surrounding the east side where Crest has been devastated by the Laguna Fire in the 70's and the Cedar Fire in 2003. The other area of concentration is along the La Cresta grade in an effort to prevent both intentional and accidental roadside fire starts. There is much to be done to be ready for this grant, and the Council is asking those who are in these areas to contact the Crest Fire Safe Council (CFSC) either by calling 44-CREST, or emailing us at [crestfiresafecouncil@yahoo.com](mailto:crestfiresafecouncil@yahoo.com). There are a lot of properties that surround Crest that are in the MSCP (Multiple Species Conservation Plan). In order to work in these areas, many government forms need to be filled out and owners are to be contacted. CFSC will be hosting town hall meetings for the purpose of educating our community on the methods that will be used and how we will still be protecting our environment. Look on the community bulletin boards and attend these meetings in order to stay informed. A previously awarded grant regarding removal of brush is presently in limbo due to some legal issues. As soon as Crest Fire Safe Council knows of the disposition, those that have called 44-CREST to have their land worked on by the documented displaced farm workers in Fire Storm 2007 will be contacted.



## South Lane Park

The E-Crest-Rians are getting ready to sign a lease with County Parks for the use of five acres of South Lane Park. This lease needs to be in place before we can apply to the Supervisor for the announcer's booth and bathroom that has been promised since the Cedar Fire. The Friends of Crest will be assisting by being our fiduciary agent until Crest Fire Safe Council gets their 501©3.

Thanks to Luna Construction, dirt has been dropped off to help with erosion and flooding issues near South Lane. As you can see, we are in need of a lot of dirt to raise the level toward South Lane to prevent flooding during the rainy season.

The county has surprised us with a proposal to fence the park using a wood-looking cement split rail fence. I am not sure where the financing is coming from, or when they will start, but I would like feed back as to where you would like openings and gates. Please contact me at [kandhyfranklin@cox.net](mailto:kandhyfranklin@cox.net). So far, with the 300 emails that I have sent out, and the discussion at the Crest Community Association meeting, the response is favorable with only a few in opposition. The county plans to do the same type of fencing at Old Ironsides Park in Harbison Canyon, so we will have a chance to see it and how vandal proof it is.

Please be eyes and ears for the park as it has been vandalized with illegal dumping lately.

## Crestridge Ecological Reserve

If you've passed through Crestridge in the last six months, in the Horsemill Road

entrance area, you may have noticed the hundred of plastic cones in the meadow area. These plant protectors are part of work underway to restore this area to a native grassland. Currently, most of the area is populated by non-native and highly invasive plants that can out-compete the plants that make up the native local habitats such as chaparral, coastal sage scrub, and oak woodlands.

Students visiting the Reserve on school science field trips are planting Purple Needlegrass (*Nassella pulchra*). This plant is California's official 'state grass' because it has been one of the most widespread native grasses in the state. Here's a great description of the plant and its history from the Quail Ridge Wilderness Conservancy.

- This native perennial grass is a signature species for our state, since it is the most extensive and widespread native grass in California, with a range extending from the California-Oregon border to Baja California.
- It is a beautiful, hardy and long-lived plant (individual plants live up to 100+ years).
- Its seed was one of several used by many California Native Americans as a food source.
- During the period of Mexican ownership of California and the huge cowhide and tallow industry developed by the Mexicans, the grasses of the Central Valley, including *Nassella pulchra*, were the basis of cattle grazing and subsistence.
- It is an important food source for many animal species.
- The deep root systems (6-15 feet) of the grass support the survival of oak seedlings, especially in warmer areas of the state, by maintaining moisture in the soil for the seedlings and by promoting the growth of mycorrhizal fungi, which are important to the health of oaks.
- As a hardy, drought-resistant plant, Purple Needlegrass is very well suited for xeric (dry) landscapes and for restoration projects.

- Once established it aids greatly in suppressing the growth and spread of non-native invasive weeds, such as the ubiquitous and noxious yellow star thistle.
- A state grass serves as both a symbol of and a tool for teaching about the natural environment of early California.

In addition, this plant provides important food and cover for animals; birds (seeds), and butterflies (when in bloom) and reduces soil erosion. They may remain green and growing late into the summer, rather than dying and drying out in May, reducing fire hazard in the mid summer. (SDSU/Soils Ecology Restoration Group). At Crestridge, we have observed the local Desert Cottontail rabbits munching on the grasses. However, the rabbits never munch the grasses to ground; rather they leave plenty of the plant to keep itself growing – and ready for the next meal! This grass also stays green (holds moisture) longer than the non-native grass species often found in our open space areas.

In the restoration area at Crestridge, the plant protectors stay on for a few weeks – a few months, until the plants are big enough to withstand some munching and extremes of weather. The plants will also be watered through their first summer and be tended by dedicated volunteers who will keep the weeds in check until the plants are large enough to hold their own against them. After the first 1-2 year, the grassland habitat will need minimal maintenance and we should start to see the return of more native insects that thrive in this environment. They will of course provide food for birds and small mammals, which provide food for raptors and larger mammals. A healthy ecosystem in action!

If you prefer not to camp in your own backyard, here are a few nearby campsites you may enjoy. Please call ahead for updated information about the campground before you go.

**Palomar Mountain State Park** has spectacular views of the Pacific, camping, picnicking, and trout fishing in Doane Pond. East of the park is the Palomar Observatory. The park re-opens April 1, 2008 due to fire damage. 19952 SP Road P.O. Box 175, Palomar Mountain, CA 92060. The park is off Highway 76, up Highway S-6, then left on Highway S-7 at the junction near the mountaintop. Phone for more information: (760)742-3462

**Pio Pico, Thousand Trails, CA** is located southeast of San Diego at the site of old Rancho Jamul. The park is on 180 acres with pools, saunas, miniature golf, hiking and biking areas, youth and adult centers and plenty of room to relax. Phone: (800)480-5611, 14615 Otay Lakes Rd, Jamul, CA 91935. Take I-805 south to Telegraph Canyon Road exit and travel east. Continue straight on Telegraph Canyon Road, which becomes Otay Lakes Road. Follow for about 17 miles to preserve.

**Laguna Mountain Recreational Area** is located at an elevation of 6,000 feet. The campsite includes paved roads, showers, and restrooms. The area has hiking trails and a meadow. In season there are children's activities on Saturdays. Fires are allowed in designated fire pits only. Campground has first-come, first-served sites. Reservations are also available at nearby Burnt Rancheria when Laguna is fully booked.

Take I-8 to Sunrise Highway exit. Go approximately 13 miles to Laguna / El Prado Campground, just beyond the 26 mile marker. Stop at entrance for campground information and site location.

The park also has Native American, Gold Mining and Natural History exhibits. Fishing is seasonal.

Peak season – 5/15-9/15. There are areas of Cuyamaca Rancho State Park that are closed due to damage from the Cedar Fire and drought. There may also be extra noise and dust when dead trees are being removed.

The park is East of San Diego on Highway 79, five miles north of I-8.

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# Critters In Crest

## Scorpions

Mark, of Rainbow Farms Market fame, suggested this subject. If you have another subject (critter) that you would like to see written about in this column, please tell Linda Hjelle, the editor of The Crest Sun.

When we first moved here (to Crest), I found the dead carcass of a scorpion in the dining room area of our newly purchased *old* house. We didn't see another one, dead or alive, for years!

Then, some three years ago, we were in bed, ready to turn out the lights, when we saw a scorpion in the upper right section of our bedroom on the wall! What to do? I ran to my "shop" and put on a pair of work gloves. I went back inside, grabbed some toilet paper from the bathroom, and then grabbed the scorpion with the toilet paper and proceeded to flush it down the toilet. I was hoping this would not be a continuing problem! So far, it has *not* been a continuing problem. Some scorpions are just very slim and can squeeze through very narrow openings, and certainly around the screens of open doors!

More recently, my wife drained her cement pond (of past Critters articles fame) for cleaning and to put another coat of pool paint in it. After *some* days, two scorpions appeared in the dry pit of the pond, (along with a stink bug, another subject for a future article). They couldn't get out. I removed them using an "as seen on TV" grabber.

Thinking that scorpions were poisonous, I didn't want to handle them with my bare hands, thus the use of the "grabber". Researching this article, I found out that they probably wouldn't have hurt me much, though their sting is painful, like that of bees, wasps and some ants, and so a sting wouldn't be fatal (unless the individual stung was allergic). However, the Bark Scorpion's sting is considered *dangerous to humans*, but fear not, they are not found here in Crest. They are found only in the extreme eastern portions of Southern California, in Arizona and the Western portions of New Mexico as well as in the northern portions of adjacent Mexican states to the south.

Scorpions are not insects but are arthropods (like spiders) in the class *Arachnida* and order *Scorpionida*. They are unusual in that they have the stinging tail and claws instead of pedipalps.

Scorpions are nocturnal, predatory little critters that feed on a variety of insects, spiders, centipedes, and even other scorpions!

Large scorpions occasionally feed on vertebrates, such as small lizards, snakes, and mice. Most scorpions live in warm, dry climates (like Crest).

Scorpions do not see well, and so depend a lot on touch. When they run, they hold their pincers outstretched and the stinger is usually curved upward. Scorpions that hide under stones and other objects during the day tend to carry their stinger to one side, whereas burrowing scorpions hold their stinger up over their backs.

The most common scorpion in Southern California (and the US in general) is the Striped Tail Scorpion (or striped scorpion), a burrowing scorpion that grows to about 2 ½ inches long, and poses no real danger to humans. Another common scorpion that *could* be found in Crest is the Arizona Hairy Scorpion which grows to a length of 5 to 7 inches long, also no real danger to humans (but they sting).

In their mating ritual, the male grabs the female's claws with his own claws and they do a dance that can last for hours. The male deposits a sperm packet and maneuvers the female over it. Once drawn into the female genital opening, the male must be quick, *and lucky* to escape, or the female will eat him.

A mother scorpion produces 25 to 35 young that are born live and crawl up onto their mother's back where they live until their first molt. They molt five or six times before reaching adulthood in one to six years, depending on species. On average, scorpions live 3 to 5 years, some 10 to 15.

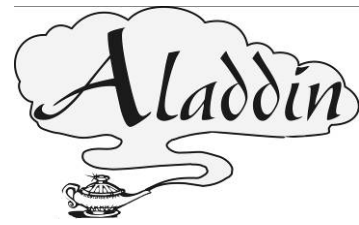
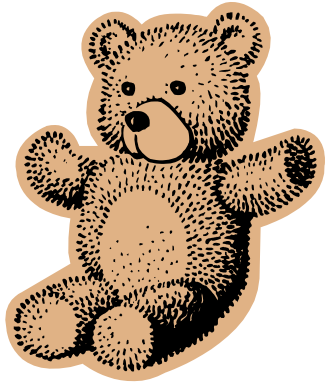

## Message from the Regional Community Fire Recovery Team 2007 Fire Recovery Update

As we gradually move forward in the long-term recovery I would like to update you on what is happening behind the scenes to help communities and families recover.

**Community Recovery Centers:** There are recovery centers in each of the major areas devastated by the 2007 fires. 1) Harris Fire Recovery located in the Dulzura Community Center serving, Deerhorn Valley, Dulzura and Potrero/Tecate, 2) Ramona, 3) Fallbrook, 4) Escondido, 5) Rancho Barnardo, 6) Valley Center, and 7) Tribal areas.

Each recovery center is providing a source of information and help for individual families in need in the form of insurance workshops, referral services to partner agencies that can help with case work, and immediate needs.

With help from grants from The San Diego Foundation, centers were set up and now form a Regional Long-Term Recovery Team. Once a month representatives from each center meet together to discuss how recovery is progressing, what the needs are in their home community, and how to get help from over 25 partner agencies such as The Salvation Army, The Red Cross, CRWRC and Volunteer San Diego and many others who have stepped forward to help. Together this group addresses problems that arise and helps to find solutions.

There is an advisory team, of which I am a member, funded by The San Diego Foundation, which was put in place to assist the local centers in getting established. Our team had many years to learn about recovery from the experience in the 2003 Cedar fire as many of the recovery centers stayed open for 3 ½ years assisting families. The advisory team supports the region by running team meetings, making sure resources are shared, locating gaps in services, and trouble shooting when necessary.

*No single authority can prepare for or respond to major disasters as effectively as your community. A community led recovery is the public sphere in which organizations --*

*public, private, and civil -- join together to address the issue of mutual aid and support. And that is what we are trying to put in place for the region of San Diego. Because as we discovered in the Cedar Fire, no Cavalry will come to our rescue! We are the Cavalry! Recovery is one step at a time day after day. And we depend upon our neighbors, community leaders and partner agencies to help us reestablish our lives. It is a challenging task, but it is possible with patience, endurance, support of family, friends and community, and down right cussedness!*

Many Crest residents are helping 2007 fire survivors by mentoring, assisting with insurance issues, helping them build new homes, and providing funds for the much needed gift cards. If you would like to help you may contact any of the centers and volunteer. The closest centers to Crest are located in Dulzura and Ramona. 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# About Crest..

## *The Train in Crest!*

The first question people always ask is "Have you always loved trains?" The answer is yes, but no more than anyone else. The second question is "How did you come up with this idea?" It all started when Dennis had put an old Calvary wagon, a water tower, and a gold mining scene in the front yard, and jokingly told his friend Randy Baars that he was going to put a train in and have it run all the way around the house. Well, Randy believed him and thought it would be a good idea. In December of 2005, Randy called Dennis and told him to look online at the "Rawhide" western amusement park in Scottsdale, Arizona. They were moving their amusement park, along with their train, to a new location and selling one-half mile of railroad track. It was at this time that Randy and Dennis both decided they each wanted to put a train on their property! Dennis would put his in Crest and Randy's would reside at his retirement home overlooking the Grand Canyon in Arizona. Dennis and Randy were off to Arizona to purchase the railroad track.



The railroad ties and rails were dismantled by hand and transported to Crest. Immediately, Randy and Dennis began working laying out the track. Dennis's son-in-law joined the over-whelming endeavor. As they worked on the track it became clear, soon they would need a train! After searching the Internet daily for three months, there it was - finally! Unfortunately, it was located across the United States in Fitchburg, Massachusetts. Originally, it was at the "Rocky Point" amusement park in Rhode Island, where it ran for approximately 20 years. At that time, the train was named the "Rocky Point Express." It was then sold to "Santa's Land USA" in Putney, Vermont, and renamed "Santa's Land Express." It ran there for many years until it was later replaced. The train then moved to Fitchburg, Massachusetts, where a small amusement park was trying to get established. After two unsuccessful years trying to get a permit, he decided to let the train go and that is how Dennis and Susie obtained the train.

The train is estimated to be approximately 32 years old. The boiler and the tender cars are called the "locomotive." The cars pulled by the locomotive are called the "train." It has a 24-inch gauge, which means the cast iron wheels under the locomotive and the rail which they are set upon are both spaced 24 inches apart. It has two passenger cars that each holds 12 people. One car is not in good condition and will be restored later. The total length of the locomotive and the one passenger car (train) is 53-feet, with the smoke stack it is eight feet tall. In total, the locomotive and one passenger car (train) weigh 10,000 lbs. Real steam locomotives have a boiler where the steam generator converts water into steam. Their boiler in reality is just an empty shell and is pushed by the tender. The tender is the car directly behind the steam locomotive, which typically carries coal, oil or wood. Their locomotive's tender has a six-cylinder Ford engine concealed in it and runs on gasoline. The smoke stack is diamond shaped on the top, which means it would have been a wood burning locomotive.

Their train was purchased in April of 2006 and was shipped across the United States to Crest. It had been painted red, blue, black and yellow and needed a lot of work; however, it also had a lot of character. It has since been repainted a high-gloss black. Native Americans use to refer to trains as the "Iron Horse," so that was painted on the side of the boiler car. The train's new name is "C&W RAILWAYS" which is painted on the side of the tender. The letter "C" stands for coyote, which is Randy's nickname. The "W" stands for wolf, that being the lone wolf, Dennis. Dennis has installed a switch on the track. This will enable him to park the passenger cars on a different track when not in use and will also serve as a place to park it when repairs are needed. Dennis has built a trestle (bridge) in the front yard, which goes over a pond. The train will travel through an above ground 55-foot mine shaft with a mining scene inside and will pass different points of interest on their one-acre lot. Once the train is completely ready, rides will be free and open to the public.

## **CREST GARDEN CLUB NEWS:**

The garden club enjoyed a field trip to the Ranch Santa Fe Fire Station for their April 14 meeting, and learned lots of useful information from urban forester, Mike Scott. He helps to coordinate the **Shelter-in-place** community of Cielo, in Rancho Santa Fe. **Shelter-in-place (SIP) means you can safely shelter in your home during a wildfire if you cannot safely evacuate on dangerous roads.**

Mandatory guidelines in these communities govern fire resistive home construction, fire-resistive landscape, and maintaining that fire resistive landscape.

The terrain in Rancho Santa Fe, the chaparral, and the two lane access roads, are

features similar to those in our community, and club members felt that they came away with a lot of useful information.

Among the good preventative measures mentioned were:

- Cut all dead plant materials, and clear debris from under plantings.
- Keep plants around the house irrigated.
- Don't plant trees right next to the house.
- Check fire safe plant lists for low fuel plantings.
- Check your home for gaps, and vents which can allow ember penetration, and repair or upgrade.
- Keep native vegetation thinned and lightly irrigated in summer.
- If you do evacuate, make sure your home is tightly closed, your porches, patios and adjacent areas are cleared of furnishings, and interior window treatments, and other flammables, are away from the window areas.

The Crest Garden Club normally meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the month at 10:00am. Meetings are held either at the Crest Clubhouse, or a member's home. The May meeting will be held one week earlier, Monday, May 5<sup>th</sup>, and is to be workday at the Clubhouse. We hope to get the rest of the plants planted. Refreshments will be provided by Debbie Fox. There will be a Grand Opening on June 7 so we want everything to be ready. Hope you can make it.

# Trash- Why is it so Confusing?

Why am I so confused as to what can go in the recycle bin vs the trash can? After checking it out, I now understand. Procedures vary by company and products especially when it comes to plastics- there are so many rules!

Commingled recyclables consist of Glass (brown, clear or green), Aluminum cans, and plastics. Cans and bottles should be free of caps and have less than 5% food debris. Glass mirrors, baking dishes, windows, etc can not be put in the recycle bin.

Plastics appear to be even more confusing. Plastics are identified with a 1 to 7 value.

Often there is an ID code on the bottom of the container. Typically level 1 and 2 are accepted (which are the recycled reimbursed plastic.) It seems levels 3-7 with narrow necks and screw top containers are accepted but it gets very specific. Plastics without numbers are not accepted by Waste Management, Crest's main waste disposal company. To get a better idea of how this is defined and what is accepted, go to the waste management specification sheet at:

Plastic bags are not accepted so you should return them to your local grocery store where most have recycle bins for these bags. Plastic newspaper covers and dry cleaner bags are not accepted in the recycle bins.

Paper - Most paper and cardboard is accepted: Newspapers/inserts/magazines, white computer paper, junk mail/magazines/phone books, coupons. Cardboard (including packing boxes), soda boxes, cereal, cake, chip, and cracker boxes (with linings removed), tissue boxes, and cardboard egg cartons are also accepted. Paper which can not be recycled includes tissue, waxed, and carbon paper. Towels or paper that has been in contact with food is not acceptable.

## More About Trash...

- **Residue or contaminants** on recyclable materials can turn the whole bin into trash. Not only can co-mingling of trash and recyclables ruin your batch, but it can also contaminate other materials if it is dumped into the truck meant only for recyclables. If it's not removed before it goes to the processing plant, the trash can damage expensive machinery used to separate recyclables. Make sure to keep liquids, food, yard waste or other non-recyclable trash out of your recyclables, and rinse out bottles, cans and jars.



- **Recycle Centers:** Don't forget there are many recycle centers that will pay you to redeem your cans and bottles for CRV. Look for the recycle symbol on your cans and bottles. Call the center before you take your recyclables. Not all centers redeem or accepts all items. Below are some centers near Crest to check out.

- **E-Waste:** Consists of TVs, laptop computers, monitors and other cathode ray tubes (CRTs), in addition to "other" e-waste such as fax machines, VCRs, printers, camcorders, stereos and microwaves. The waste management recycle center on 925 OConner Street in El Cajon accepts e-waste (free of charge to drop off -- please limit to one or two of the same item per visit.) Go to <http://www.wastemanagementsd.com/buyback.asp> for more information.
- **Prescriptions:** Remember how they used to tell you to flush your old prescriptions down the toilet? Well now they find that this can end up in the lakes and rivers, and contaminate the fish that you eat! There is really no good alternative since most pharmacies will not accept expired medications. One suggestion is to throw away your medications, but first render them unusable by putting glue (such as Elmer's) in with the pills and throwing them out in a sealed container.
- **Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Locations** - There are a lot of products that we use every day around our homes, such as batteries, household cleaners, cosmetics and medications, that need to be disposed of in a special way. These items are classified as "household hazardous waste" (HHW), and should never be discarded in a sink, storm drain or in your household trash -- instead the items should be taken to a household hazardous waste collection center. El Cajon Recycling **El Cajon Recycling Center**, 925 O'Conner St accepts hazardous waste by appointment only.
- **Recycled Used Motor Oil and Filters at the Curb** – Place filter in a plastic bag (Call Waste Management at 596-5100 to schedule a pick-up and obtain bags assuming you have pick up service through Waste Management). There is a limit of 2 gallons per pick up day. This is offered through the County of SD and Waste Management.





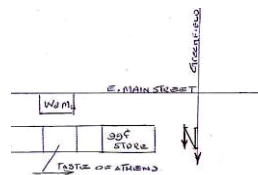

## TV Converter Box Program

What is the digital television transition? At midnight on February 17, 2009, all full-power television stations in the United States will stop broadcasting in analog and switch to 100% digital broadcasting. Digital broadcasting promises to provide a clearer picture and more programming options and will free up airwaves for use by emergency responders

### What is the TV Converter Box Coupon Program?

Congress created the TV Converter Box Coupon Program for households wishing to keep using their analog TV sets after February 17, 2009. The Program allows U.S. households to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40 that can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes. A TV connected to cable, satellite or other pay TV service does not require a TV converter box from this program.

Consumers have a variety of options. Options to explore include:

- Keep your existing analog TV and purchase a TV converter box. A converter box plugs into your TV and will keep it working after Feb. 17, 2009, or
- Connect to cable, satellite or other pay service, or
- Purchase a television with a digital tuner.

### How do I request a coupon?

Between January 1, 2008 and March 31, 2009, you can request a coupon while supplies last in one of four ways:

## ***Elliot Binley***

**Long Time Crest Resident**

**November 7, 1934 – April 21, 2008**

Elliott Binley, long time resident of Crest, passed away from cancer on April 21, 2008. Elliott was born November 7, 1934 and lived his younger years in Massachusetts. He was from a family of ship builders, which instilled in him a lifelong love of ships and sailing. Elliott met his wife, Sylvia, while working for the San Diego County Probation Department where he worked for more than three decades. They moved to Crest over 35 years ago. Their property on the south side of Crest includes a historic rock cabin that was one of the first structures in the community. (See "About Crest" in the January Crest Sun.) Elliott was a dedicated member of the Crest Historical Society for many years and a loyal supporter of Friends of Crest. He treasured the open space surrounding the town and supported efforts to maintain Crest's rural character and native habitat. He also volunteered at the San Diego Maritime Museum and the San Diego Natural History Museum. He is survived by his wife Sylvia, 4 children, 4 grandchildren, and 8 great grandchildren.
