We want YOU to be on FIRE, not our community; so get involved, and come to the **next Crest Fire Safe Council (CFSC) meeting Tuesday, June 4<sup>th</sup>, at 7 pm** at the clubhouse. We will be having elections, setting committees and an agenda to keep moving toward the Crest community's goals. CFSC will also discuss grant opportunities and how to continue our Crest Emergency Call system. If you cannot make it to the meeting but would like to help, send an email to Kandhy Franklin at: <u>kandhyfranklin@cox.net</u> to let her know what you would like to do to help.

**Emergency Call System**: The emergency call system is set up to call Crest residents in the event of an emergency. All Crest residents can be a part of this system for free and can submit up to three phone numbers and an email to be on the contact list. Our call system is constantly maintained by Kathy Fiedor, and Debbie Milligan-Fox and we are functioning at 93% completion rate. Remember to make sure we have **your correct phone numbers.** Any changes please email them to Kandhyfranklin@cox.net to the above address. Ask your neighbors to be a part of the system. Remember, when you get the One Call Now it will show up as 44-CREST (442-7378) on your phone. If you want to add or be opted out, you may call your CFSC or the company, One Call Now at 877-698-3262. Our group number is 138144.

Since we are coming into the summer and brush is dry, <u>we will need donations</u> for the CFSC to continue our call system. Anything will help. As of now we have 1,700+ calls that we make to you, costing about \$.06 a call. We have banked 10,000 calls that are prepaid that we can make. But as you know that goes fast in an emergency. You can mail a donation to the CFSC using the clubhouse's address; 113 N. Park Drive, El Cajon, CA 92021.

**Emergency Fire Siren**: CFSC will once again be working on improving the fire siren. Please watch for the sign board for the announcement for an upcoming siren test. Local authorities will also be notified.

We need a small grant to order a "warbler" which will change the intensity and pitch of the sound of the siren. In this way, more residents will hear the siren in the event of an emergency. While this will improve the system, there may still be issues in part because of new building codes requiring dual- paned glass windows.

**<u>Firewise Community</u>**. We are hoping to have Faith Berry of "Firewise" visit us at this meeting and explain the benefits of being a "Firewise" community.

Working to keep us safe and educated is everyone's responsibility. Our collective actions will keep us safer and more prepared! <u>SEE YOU AT THE MEETING!!</u>

been a guest of Suzanne and Roger Mullins this past year, while participating in an exchange program. April has been volunteering at Montgomery Middle School assisting and completing her research. What a great experience this has been for April and also for the students who have been able to meet April and learn about China.

This is April's second year in California; she volunteered last year in Riverside at an elementary school. Suzanne, a school board member for the Cajon Valley School District, graciously offered to host April this year while she volunteered in the District. April's program will end in June, and she will be soon returning home.

April admits she is anxious to be returning to her home town of Changsha, China. Changsha, is the capital city of Hunan, in south-central China. Wikipedia tells me its municipality covers an area of 4,563 sq mi and, according to the 2010 Census, has a population of 7,044,118 inhabitants. Surprisingly, April describes her city as quite small in comparison to other cities in China.

April will be returning home to finish up her Master's Degree in education and to start looking for a job. She is not certain what type of job she wants at this time; perhaps working with adults, for the government, or even for a private company are all possibilities. While her degree is in teaching, the English proficiency she has acquired while being in the United States may open other possibilities for her.

I asked April if she enjoyed her stay in Crest, "Yes, Crest is amazing, a very beautiful and peaceful community, and the people are very nice. Riverside was a much larger city, and I didn't have as much opportunity to be out and about in the community. In Crest, everyone is friendly and there were community events I was able to attend." When I asked April about some memories she will take back with her, she explained, "I liked to go to the (CCA) dinners and meeting people. The (Kiwanis) Easter Egg Hunt and Christmas with Roger and Suzanne's family are good memories as well as the birthday party Suzanne gave me. I want to thank Roger and Suzanne for the great experience."

## Coyote Country – Remember when...

In 1998, a couple years after my husband and I moved to Crest, we noticed the opening of a new coffeehouse across the street from what is now the Rainbow Market on La Cresta Blvd. At first, it was a place for us to stop for a cinnamon roll and a cup of coffee on the way to work. Before long, it became a place to gather on the weekends to hear local music and have a nice, relaxing casual dinner.



Before this unique little café entered our lives, there was no gathering place to hang out and get acquainted, and consequently, we knew few folks in Crest. That soon changed and it was during this time we met so many of our long-time Crest friends. Coyote Country soon came alive with music as local groups started visiting the Crest stage with an amazing variety of talent. The Granddaddy-o's, David Silva, and Don Halte, were a few of the local talent that frequented the cafe. It was a great place to take our "off the hill" friends as well as our out-



of-town company. Coffeehouse owner, Willa Winters, Chris Seebold and staff, worked hard to provide the kind of establishment where folks would feel welcomed and cherished.

But with only 3,000 people in the town, business was not as brisk as it needed to be. The little coffeehouse struggled to stay on its feet. In September, 2001, the darling little coffee shop was forced to close its doors.

We think fondly of this little coffeehouse and hope that someday someone else will share this dream for a beautiful little building in this lovely, funky little hamlet of Crest.

Attendees of all ages can take part in creating the annual Street Fair mural or playing outdoor laser tag. With more than 200 vendors, local artists, and entertainment on several different stages, this will be one fun filled day!

A kaleidoscope of colorful wildflowers splash bold colors across the desert dunes, creating a spectacular floral display. ## COUNTY SUPERVISORS BACK BIPARTISAN BILLS TO SAVE RAMONA AIRPORT TRAFFIC CONTROL TOWER

#### Congressional legislation aims to halt June 15 closure of FAA tower

The county Board of Supervisors on Tuesday (4/23) urged federal lawmakers to approve pending legislation in Congress that would save the Ramona Airport traffic control tower. The board, on a 5-0 vote, endorsed a pair of bipartisan bills that would halt the June 15 closure of the East County facility, along with nearly 150 other towers funded by the Federal Aviation Administration. The FAA announced the closures earlier this year, citing sequestration. Supervisors Dianne Jacob and Ron Roberts are leading local opposition to the move, stressing that the Ramona tower is critical to public safety. Air traffic controllers coordinate the movement of Cal Fire tankers and other firefighting aircraft based at the airstrip.

"San Diego County is wildfire country so it's critical that the tower remains open," said Jacob, the board vice-chairwoman. "I urge Congressional lawmakers to right this wrong and to keep the public safe." "It is vital we align with federal leaders who support halting the politically-orchestrated closure of airport control towers," said Supervisor Ron Roberts. "Clearly, the FAA needs to continue staffing the Ramona Airport control tower, especially as San Diego County approaches the heart of fire season following a period of low rainfall." The control tower was established in response to a 1995 incident in the San Diego County backcountry, in which three people died in an aerial collision involving federal firefighting aircraft.

The board backed two bills – H.R. 1432 and S. 687 – that would keep open 149 towers targeted under federal sequestration. The legislation was introduced on April 9 and enjoys broad support from Democrats and Republicans. Senate bill 687 would prohibit the closures during the 2013 and 2014 fiscal years. House bill 1432 would transfer money within the FAA to keep the facilities in operation.

The Cal Fire air base at the Ramona airport responds to more than 400 calls a year. During major wildfires, up to 18 firefighting aircraft can operate out of the airfield. In addition, the airport handles more than 155,000 general aviation operations annually. Other prominent officials who have raised concerns about the closure include Dave Hanneman, chief of the Chula Vista Fire Department and president of the San Diego County Fire Chiefs' Association, and Ray Chaney, air operations division chief with Cal Fire.

#### Myofascial Release; Deep Tissue's Other Half.

All over our body is a connective tissue called fascia. It is connected from the feet to the head and all the way to the tips of our fingers. When we are younger our fascia is new and

releases or "melts" freely because it's always stretched and moved from playing, running around and constant movement. Yet as we age our fascia becomes tight, stiff and when over worked and not stretched it can lead to knots, sore spots and what we sometimes think is tight muscles. Fascial tissue covers all our muscles when it becomes tight it and can put strain creating them to be compact and stuck.

The myofascial release approach is a form of massage therapy used to treat pain and restriction of motion. It is a treatment described by Andrew Taylor Still, founder of osteopathy/osteopathic medicine, to achieve release of myofascial tissues through continual palpatory feedback. This is said to be accomplished by relaxing contracted muscles, increasing circulation and lymphatic drainage, and stimulating the stretch reflex of muscles and overlying fascia.

When we receive a massage with myofascial techniques this helps loosen our tissue when it has gotten past the point of being able to be stretched on our own. Deep tissue techniques are great with the muscles that are underneath our fascia yet the fascia cannot release with deep tissue. It needs a broad firm pull and stretch unlike deep tissue where we sink our weight into deep layers of muscles passing the fascia. Along with a deep tissue session, when myofascial is performed first, the benefits have been shown to last longer and heal faster! It's amazing how due to fascia, we could have a tight pain in our leg and the culprit is fascial tissue bind up in our backs. Even pains in our backs can be stemming from bound up tissue in our feet.

Try a myofascial approach accompanied with a deep tissue massage to better address those tension spots and watch how you will have better pain or discomfort management and feel amazing. Remember that the healing process takes time and maintenance. Multiple sessions are a common practice to help keep the body from returning to its discomfort stage, and the healing process can also be a slight roller coaster till the issue has finally healed. If you are keeping up with the stretching advice and other health advice your therapist shares with you, you will find yourself maintaining your comfort on your own! We are here when you need that extra support and jump start along with healthy monthly maintenance.

F. ACTION ITEMS. Presentation by Advocates for Safe Airport Policy in reference to expansion of Gillespie Field. Chairman Wally Riggs welcomed several citizens including representatives of Advocates for Safe Airport Policy (ASAP), and invited them to address the Planning Group concerning potential expansion of Gillespie Field. Sue Strom explained that ASAP speaks for hundreds of residents of El Cajon, Lakeside and Santee who oppose the proliferation of flying school training operations based from Gillespie Field, which has virtually no regulations (i.e., curfew hours, noise abatement, etc.) controlling this use. Betty Chafetz described the County Board of Supervisors' approval of an Economic Development Council grant to develop Gillespie Field and Brown Field into Regional Airtropolis Land that would be intended for hotels, corporate offices and facilities for businesses that are airport dependent. She warned that flight training is a major business at Gillespie Field, that increased training operations results in the spread of more flights over larger local areas, and in the increase of engine emissions producing more smog and lead pollution that is a health hazard to children and adults exposed to these (and other) airport impacts. Ed Blitz guestioned the need for a Regional Airtropolis project at Gillespie Field, stating that currently there are 700,000 square feet of available business space within 2 blocks of Gillespie Field, and that some of the existing airport facilities are rented and sublet for non-airport industry uses such as storage of personal belongings, recreational vehicles, motorcycles, etc. Robert Durman also stated that some aviation hangers at Gillespie Field are rented for nonaviation purposes, that general aviation is a dying industry that has declined 21% in the past 20 years except for the flight training sector, and that flight training has concentrated already at Gillespie Field because of its lack of noise and other regulations, and its unrestricted operations as a base for night flying training. The ASAP speakers distributed handouts about various aspects of the Gillespie Field issue to Planning Group members. 2Planning Group members discussed the impacts to Subregional residents that are the unmitigated results of Gillespie Field operations and business arrangements, including negative impacts to property values located in the airport's flight paths as well as noise impacts, health and stress impacts, air pollution and community lead exposure, etc. Pat Ulm moved that the Planning Group sends a letter to Supervisor Diane Jacob and the other County Supervisors, requesting the County's help in setting parameters for various Gillespie Field operations (i.e., control of flight paths for low flying aircraft; ground tower control for night hours of operation; noise abatement; mitigation for air quality impacts and community lead exposure; security checks for Gillespie Field personnel and users; crash and hazard abatement efforts; etc.) that impact health, safety and property values of current residents of the Planning Group Subregion. (Copies of this letter will be sent to the Gillespie Field Airport Authority, Federal Aviation Administration, Duncan Hunter, Susan Davis and Juan Vargas). The motion did not pass (6 yes; 1 no: Hertel; 1 abstain: Myrick). Chairman Riggs stated that he could write a letter affirming that a majority of the Group members present, although not a Group quorum, favored County help in addressing current and potential future impacts of Gillespie Field operations. Jeff Myrick supported such a letter to Supervisor Jacob, asking if her staff could help inform the Planning Group about the issues of Gillespie Field's current and future operations.

**1. Announcements and correspondence** Lory Walls announced she attended a County Trails meeting sponsored by Supervisor Jacob, where it was announced that the State Department of Fish and Wildlife (formerly State Department of Fish and Game) might shut down and close off certain elements of the California Hiking and Riding Trail.

**Discussion and group action items**. Authorization of payment for use of the Crest Community Association meeting room. Pat Ulm reported that the Crest Community Association proposes a use charge of \$15 per hour for a minimum of 4 hours, totaling a minimum charge of \$60 per meeting for the CCA meeting room. Chairman Riggs said the agenda of the March meeting would include discussion and approval of the proposed CCA use charges for Planning Group meetings held in Crest. Riggs also said the Superintendent of Dehesa School assured him the Group would be able to meet at the school, and that the May meeting would occur there (and be chaired by Jason Harris, Planning Group Vice-chairman). **3d. Discussion and group action items. Declaration of vacant seats 4, 14 and 15.** the Group will advertise simultaneously for candidates for three Group vacancies: one Crest seat (No. 4) and two Granite Hills seats (No. 14 and No. 15).

4. Subcommittee reports. PLDO (Bowen). Judy Bowen, the Park Lands Dedication Ordinance (PLDO) Ad Hoc Subcommittee of one, reported that the Department of Parks and Recreation has prepared a preliminary draft proposal for the South Lane Park Fitness Trail Project. The available PLDO funds could construct a short trail with 2 to 3 fitness stations, as well as providing a picnic table and the required ADA parking. Judy said she contacted the Crest Sun newsletter to publish an article the first of Marsh about the County's Fitness Trail Project plan for South Lane Park, and to solicit community input prior to having the PLDO issue included on the

Group's agenda for its April meeting. she also mentioned that there was no new specific information about a Maintenance Entity that would be responsible for South Lane Park maintenance of improvements.


#### The following are segments from the April 8, 2013 minutes regarding Crest.

**TPM 21080 Bongiovanni Montana Serena Project**. Chairman Riggs introduced this project, a Minor Subdivision of 16.76 acres into four residential lots, located at 15030 Montana Serena, explaining that County has announced its intent to adopt a Negative Declaration, pursuant to Section 15183 of the California Environmental Quality Act. He reminded the Group that on 10 May 2011 it recommended approval of the project by a vote of 10 yes, 1 no, and 0 abstain. There was no further discussion of the project, and there was no Group action.

**b.** Authorization of payment for use of CCA room. The cost for using the Crest Community Association meeting hall for the Group's regular meetings in January, February, March and April is \$60 per night, for a total of \$240 for the four meetings. Phil Hertel moved the Planning Group approves payment by the County of \$240 to the CCA for the use of its facility for the Group's regular monthly public meetings. The motion passed (10 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain).

c. Declaration of Seat 4 (Crest) vacancy. Chairman Riggs informed the Group that Ryan Darcy sent him an email resignation notice concerning his Seat 4 position on the Planning Group. Jack Vandover moved the Planning Group declares Seat 4 (Crest) vacant. The motion passed (10 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain). Chairman Riggs stated that Seat 4, Seat 14 and Seat 15 would all be advertised as vacant, and that candidates interested in nomination for appointment to these vacant seats will be invited to apply to the Group.

**4. Subcommittee reports** – PLDO. Judy Bowen reported she had received some emails and comments from several Crest residents concerning use of Park Land Dedication Ordinance funds for the South Lane Park exercise trail proposal. The community wants more trees, other native plant landscaping, and two bridges crossing the drainage way that can support horses crossing them. She reminded everyone that PLDO funds couldn't be used for landscaping vegetation. Chairman Riggs said the PLDO project priorities would be included on the agenda of the May meeting of the Group.

## Recollections from Gilbert Mastri About Crest in the1960s to 1980s

Conversations with long-time Crest residents often open the door to a better understanding of community history. This was especially true when I asked Gilbert Mastri to tell me about his volunteer efforts with the Crest community during the 1960's through the 1980s.

Gilbert was born in Bell, CA in 1935 in his grandmother's home by a midwife. His childhood years were a series of moves between cities and schools throughout San Diego County. As a result, by the time he was 17,

Gilbert was out of school, living on his own, working as a truck driver and even married for a very short time. One of his favorite jobs was to drive a mail truck for Star Route; part of his job was to ride the Coronado ferry three times a day delivering mail. At 19 Gilbert joined the Air Force with a friend hoping to learn to fly. After his three and a half year stint, Gilbert left the service (never did learn to fly), married, and continued his career as a truck driver and warehouse supervisor in a variety of companies mostly in the San Diego area.

In 1968 Gilbert's moved his family to Crest after driving through the area, and instantly liking the community and school. They rented a house on La Cresta Road and eventually bought a house on Jarrett Lane where he and his wife raised his two children, Tamy and Gib. The kids attended Crest Elementary, Greenfield Junior High and graduated from Granite Hills High School.

Gilbert first became involved in the community activities around 1969 when he bought horses and joined the E-Cresttrians, a local horse group. It was a great group and he and his family had many fun outings. There were also two other local groups he soon became acquainted with, the Crest Civic Group and the La Cresta Women's Club.

While Gilbert doesn't remember the exact circumstances, there was an argument going on at that time between the E-Crest-trians and the Crest Civic Group. Gilbert's first introduction to the Crest Civic Group was when he and several of the horse club members went to the Crest Civic group to make their feelings known. Apparently, things must have eventually worked out since Gilbert and several other horse group members eventually joined the Civic Group. Later he became treasurer and then president of the Civic Group for two years.

During his tenure as president, the Crest Civic Group was approached by the La Cresta Women's Club and asked if they would take over the responsibility of the La Cresta Clubhouse. The La Cresta Women's Club had been responsible for the clubhouse since the 1930's. The clubhouse property had been donated by the Cornelius family to the community in 1933, and a few years later, residents of the community built the clubhouse. The women's group members were growing older and tired of the responsibility of having to raise funds to pay for insurance and taxes on the building.

The Civic Group agreed and the building was signed over to the Crest Civic Group. (Several years later, the group changed the name from The Crest Civic Group to what is now known as Crest Community Association.)

The Crest Civic Group now needed to raise funds to support their new obligation. Because many E-crestrian members were now also Crest Civic Group members, their solution was to put on a series of fun shows. These horse shows were a big deal for the community. It was an opportunity for kids to be involved in a horse shows without the high cost.

It was also during this reign that the little building located behind the clubhouse that was used as the library for many years was relocated to South Lane Park as an announcer's booth at the South Lane Park horse arena. Unfortunately, the building burned in the 2003 fire.

. The 1970 Laguna Fire had a profound effect on the Crest community. One hundred and eighteen homes were lost and Gilbert describes his first impression of his return to the hill as a devastating moonscape scene. Since Gilbert was president of Civic Group, he became chairman of Crest Fire Disaster Committee. The committee consisted of the Civic Group board and leaders of the three Crest churches. PSA Airlines had given the community \$1500 and this committee was charged with monitoring the funds. The remaining \$150 left after distributing the money was given to Skip Conard to build a sign board at the top of the hill. The signboard was rebuilt in recent years by the Boy Scouts; however, the original PSA "Thank you" inscription remains on the bottom of the board.

After Gilbert completed his term on the Civic Group, his priorities changed, and he started concentrating his volunteer efforts toward the volunteer fire department which had roots back to 1947.

His first encounter with the fire department was in 1969. The Fire Department brought the Little Jimmy fire truck to the July 4th festivities and hooked up to fire hydrant in Nancy Jane Park. "I was one selected to dress up in fire gear and have a water fight with volunteer Joe Nilles. It was great fun. The fire department always participated in the July 4th festivities; just like it does now."

Gilbert was recruited into the department by Chief Jim Duffy and Gary Smith because of his many years' experience as a semi-truck driver. During the 1970's the fire department only had one paid position, the chief, the only member who attended the fire academy. The rest of the fire department members were trained volunteers. It was a well-known fact that the pay as chief was minimal, making it a labor of love. Under Jim's training, Gilbert learned to be a volunteer fire fighter and trained each Thursday night. He would volunteer during the days since he worked nights. There were about 30 volunteers in all, many juniors (high school kids who would volunteer after school) and seniors. The station was

manned only in the day when they would maintain equipment. If there was an emergency, there was a special call number and they would set off the siren and everyone would come running to assist with the fire or medical event.


Gilbert moved up through the volunteer ranks from engineer to lieutenant to captain and finally senior captain and assistant chief by 1975. During his time in the department the chief position changed several times because it was difficult to live on the low wages. Gilbert even served for a few months as an interim chief in 1989 and found first-hand how difficult it was live on the small amount they could offer to pay.

The district had a small working budget available through county funds, but they relied heavily on grant writing and fund raisers to purchase needed equipment and other necessities. This is where the Crest Smoke Eaters came into play. The men's Smoke Eaters Group and Women's Fire Auxiliary worked to raise money for the department. Some of Gilbert's fondest memories of Crest are participating in this organization. Gilbert remembers, "We would help elderly people that needed weed abatement for free. Mother's Day pancake breakfasts, cookouts, and organizational parties with other groups were a few of the enjoyable activities during this time. It was a very active and rewarding group."

What ever happened to the Smoke Eaters? As time went on, federal and state grants/programs became available allowing the department to start hiring full time fire fighters (still at low wages); starting with typically one paid man per shift. Once there were paid folks and different shifts and they merged with the Bostonia Fire Department to create the East County Fire Protection District, there wasn't as great a need for volunteers or fund raising. Plus many of the fire fighters weren't Crest folk any more. Eventually the organization just died off.

Gilbert moved off the hill for a few years but eventually returned to Crest with his new wife Kathleen Clark Mastri, whom he married in 1991. Kathleen's Dad, Jake Darsey, was the fire captain on the little Jimmy fire truck during the 1970 fire in Crest.

Thank you Gilbert for your many years of volunteer service to the Crest Community. Gilbert is still active with the Crest Historical Society which meets the first Tuesday of each month at the Crest Library at 1:00 pm.
