

Padre Dam Update

(Information gathered from the Padre Dam Website)

Level Two Drought Alert

Level 2 Drought rates and water use restrictions are in place in response to the 8% water use reduction by San Diego County Water Authority

<u>Watering Days and Times:</u> During Level 2 customers are limited to three (3) watering days per week. Customers may determine which three days they would like to water. Landscape irrigation using sprinklers is limited to no more than ten (10) minutes per station

To see how you stand on your water allocation, go to http://www.padredam.org/ and click on the Online Bill Calculator link. By entering your 10-digit account number and your street number, you can see how you are doing with your efforts to reduce your water usage.

Santee Lakes Development by Padre Dam

Padre Dam MWD is considering the development of a Restaurant and Cable Ski Park at Santee Lakes. Cable-skiing allows people to water-ski and wakeboard without a boat. It works just like a chair-lift at a mountain ski area. A horizontal cable, suspended on towers and powered by a quiet electric engine, pulls water-skiers and wake-boarders around a lake. A snack bar and pro shop are also being proposed as part of the project. There are approximately 5 cable parks in the United States. The Texas Ski Ranch is the closest. Kansas and Florida also have cable parks. More than 100 parks exist in Europe and Asia. Cable-skiing at Santee Lakes could open up the sport to kids and families, especially those that do not own boats. Many would walk to the park from the local neighborhoods to enjoy the activity. Santee Lakes is a "self-sufficient" operation within Padre Dam MWD. It does not receive rate payer subsidy and is not tax supported. Maybe you're moving to a larger home to accommodate a growing family, relocating for a new career opportunity, or purchasing a townhouse for retirement. Whatever the reason for the move, you'll need to take the necessary steps to sell your home for the best possible price, within a reasonable amount of time. Where do you begin?

If you're like most people, you'll start by seeking assistance from a professional. A local real estate sales associate, who knows your neighborhood, can help you determine a fair market price. The sales associate should also recommend the extent to which you should make repairs or improvements to your house.

In order to select a real estate professional who's right for you, ask family, friends and neighbors for referrals. Attend open houses and interview several sales associates to find out how professional or experienced they may be. Get a written outline of how they plan to market your property and the services they will offer you.

Once you've identified a qualified professional, the rest is chemistry. Is the sales associate someone with whom you would like to work closely? Do you feel comfortable with the sales associate as your partner, working with you to give you advice and acting as your representative? Does he or she practice a consultative selling approach, focusing on the long-term client relationship and on the importance of exceeding client needs and expectations or is he or she caught up in the proverbial 'hard sell?'

The brokerage firm that your agent is associated with is also important. Research the firm's success rate and commitment to quality service. Does it survey existing clients in order to ensure customer satisfaction? What are the results of those surveys? How in tune are they with consumer needs? Do they offer guidance with mortgages or any discounts for other home related or moving services?

Determining your home's fair market value is one of the most important decisions you'll make during the home-selling/buying process. Your sales associate can help you set a fair price based on local market conditions. For instance, she or he will provide sale prices and other statistics of homes similar to yours that have recently been sold. Prospective buyers will be comparing your home to others on the market. Therefore, setting a comprehensive price can determine if your property will or will not sell.

For the first offer made, it's rare that the prospective buyer matches the asking price. If the offer is reasonably close to the asking price, carefully consider the offer before you consider turning it down. Curiously, it's the first offer that can often be the best offer. If the first offer is unacceptable to you, it may in your best interest to have your sales associate respond with a counter offer. 

Too Many Fresh Tomatoes – How about Oven Dried or Sun Dried Tomatoes

Trying to figure out what to do with all those tomatoes at once can be challenging. How about doing a little internet research at making your own sun dried tomatoes. Here are a few of the tips I've researched. Find your own recipe online and give it a try....

Preparation: Whether sundried or oven dried, simply slice off the top of the tomato, cut it in half, scoop out the seeds, pat them dry, and place them on a cake rack or baking sheet. Roma or plum tomatoes seem to be the favorites but all types of tomatoes work including cherry tomatoes. Omit those mushy or bruised tomatoes.



- Oven Drying- lie out and optionally sprinkle with sea salt. Place them on a baking sheet or cake rack (not touching) at extremely low heat—about 150 degrees—all day long (May take 10-20 hours periodically rotating trays).
- **Sun- Drying** Optionally dust them with salt, put them out where the sun will strike them (cover with fine netting or cheese cloth to omit the bugs). It may take two days or so bring in at night.
- **How to tell when they're done** The amount of time it takes depends on the water content of the tomatoes, the thickness of the slices, and how well the air is able to circulate around them. When done, the tomatoes should be flexible, like a raisin from a fresh bag; not brittle. Most describe
- them as leathery with a deep red color, without free water or a tacky feeling.
- Storing Let the tomatoes cool to room temperature (about 20 to 30 minutes), then fill the bags. Don't overfill the bags, leave a little room for expansion. A vacuum bag is best but you can use Ziploc (or similar) bags. But be sure to squeeze out the extra air. Freezing will keep your tomatoes the best. They'll make a fine antipasto, over slices of crusty bread. They will also be quite nice sliced fine in cold pasta or rice dishes,.

Notes about packing in oils - If you like to have your dried tomatoes in a seasoned oil, such as olive oil with basil, thyme, oregano and/or minced or powdered garlic or garlic salt, it is best to do this when you are ready to eat them, or shortly before, and refrigerate them. Information that's available suggests that it is best to just do that as you use them or make up small batches and refrigerate them.

Sun-dried tomato tips: Sun-dried tomatoes will need to be reconstituted before use (unless packed in oil). Just let them soak in warm water for thirty minutes until soft and pliable, drain (reserve the liquid to add flavor to stocks and sauces), pat dry and use as directed in your recipe.) You can also use wine, broth, or other cooking liquid to reconstitute. Once reconstituted, store them in the refrigerator. (*Information gathered from various internet sites – Google "how to sun dry tomatoes for more options and recipes…*)

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Travel Tips and Tricks

- TIP #1 Miracle Suds.... Dr Bronner's Magic Soaps is a laundry detergent, liquid soap, shampoo, and toothpaste, all in one. It's actually organic, biodegradable, and has a great peppermint flavor. Go to http://www.drbronner.com for more information. Free shipping with a \$20 order. Sprouts in El Cajon carries this product if you think it's worth a try.
- TIP #2 Use a soft-sided lunch box or ice cooler to carry your digital or video camera on your next trip. The insulation will protect your equipment on the plane; the container will keep you from advertising your expensive equipment. Plus, you have the added advantage of having a cooler available for a spontaneous picnic or in-room snack during your trip.
- **TIP #3:** Carry your beach towel on your next trip. It can be used as a pillow, blanket or seat cushion on the plane. If you arrive before your hotel room is ready, head to the pool or ocean.
- **TIP #4:** Renting a car from a local, independent car rental place rather than the big national chain can save you big bucks
- **Tip #5:** Use www.Craigslist.com to book a room overseas for a fraction of the price of hotels. Be sure to check out the references since these are local listings
- **Tip #6:** Pick up a business card at your next medical visit. List your medications on the back of the card and keep it in your wallet in the event of an emergency.
- **Tip #7:** When asking directions in a strange city or country, look for folks walking their dogs since they most likely are familiar with the area.
- TIP #9: Pack a Traveling Medicine Cabinet: Going to a foreign country? Or maybe planning a remote camping trip. Perhaps you are taking a boat load of kids with you on a trip? Multiple travel websites recommend that you be sure to pack the following:
 - 1. Antacid such as Pepcid Complete for heartburn and stomach-acid control. Be careful when mixing antacids with antibiotics, however since the antacid can reduce the effectiveness.
 - 2. Band-Aids and Neosporin for cuts, blister and bruises and infection control
 - 3. *Ibuprofen* (Advil, Motrin) or *acetaminophen* (Tylenol) for pain, headaches and mild fever or muscle inflammation.
 - 4. Insect repellent with deet under 35 percent
 - 5. Motion sickness medicine such as Dramamine or Bonine (non-drowsy) or if its really bad, go to your doctor and get the "patch")
 - 6. Imodium A-D for diarrhea this stops symptoms much faster than Pepto-Bismol by several hours.
 - 7. Benadryl for relieving allergy or food symptoms.
 - 8. Sun block with a minimum of SPF30
 - 9. Cortaid or other anti-inflammatory cream which contains hydrocortisone to help with rashes and bug bites.
 - 10. Antibiotics: If you are going overseas you might want to visit your doctor and ask if he/she will prescribe an antibiotic such as Zithromax or Cipro for an effective bacterial or diarrhea cure.
 - 11. Make sure to pack a *fluid and electrolyte replacer* such as Pedialyte in case a child gets diarrhea, which can dehydrate little ones quickly.
 - 12. Carry a decongestant. Be sure to pack this medication in your carry-on luggage. If you are bringing prescription medicines it is recommend you bring your original bottle.
- **TIP #10:** Grab a copy of **Budget Travel** this month, they have some great deals for the fall. (Example: Costa Rica for \$879 including flight, car rental and hotel and some meals and tours or \$1600 for air from LA to Fiji including a beachfront room and meals.)

. SDG&E Fire Plan is All Smoke

SDG&E Fire Plan is All Smoke August 4, 2009

SDG&E has a long history of putting profit ahead of the public good. Now,

the company that fought to return record profits from lowcost energy contracts to its shareholders instead of ratepayers during the California energy crisis has a radical, untested idea to prevent backcountry wildfire.

The very same people who got caught by the *San Diego Union-Tribune* issuing unnecessary Stage 3 power alerts with plenty of power to spare in 2007 are forging ahead with a plan to kill the juice proactively.

This time, SDGE claims that what might be days-long blackouts are absolutely necessary to preempt deadly wildfires caused by its lines. If SDG&E has its way, more than 60,000 homes could be plunged into darkness when winds reach a certain speed and brush moisture drops to certain levels.

Here's what's missing from SDG&E's expensive ad campaign: power lines themselves weren't the problem in the horrific firestorms of 2007. The problem was the utility's failure to maintain them.

The details are in the "after action" report conducted by the Consumer Protection and Safety Division of the California Public Utilities Commission.

In the case of the Guejito fire, the report concluded that minimum inspection requirements were violated. In the case of the Witch Fire, inspectors discovered SDG&E infrastructure "did not have minimum separation as required" by existing regulations.

The cause of the Rice Fire in Fallbrook was especially flagrant. On July 18, 2007, an SDG&E contractor reported a sycamore tree growing into wires and ordered it be trimmed. SDG&E ignored the order. Three months later, a falling branch from the very same tree touched off the Rice Fire.

Because SDG&E is on the financial hook for the damage it caused by negligently failing to maintain its system, its "risk management" experts have come up with the shutoff plan.

As currently crafted, the plan would shift liability from the utility to taxpayers. When SDG&E decides to cut power, if homes should burn or people die in one of the 97 percent of fires not caused by power lines, taxpayers, not the utility, could be forced to foot the bill!

Given the choice between doing right by the public and protecting its bottom line, the utility is, as always, following the money.

SDG&E is choosing to bring unnecessary grief to some of our region's most vulnerable populations: seniors who are dependant on life-sustaining medical devices and refrigerated medicine, people with disabilities who can't afford highly-specialized care during a shutoff and struggling ranchers and agricultural businesses that, in

this economy, don't have thousands of dollars for specialized generators.

SDG&E's simplistic and hostile rhetoric scapegoats impacted communities and deliberately distracts from the real problem: had SDG&E followed existing state regulations back in 2007, homes would still be standing.

The utility should be garnering public support for tested and proven fire prevention measures like undergrounding, better vegetation management, swapping safer steel poles for wooden poles, wider spacing between lines to prevent arcing and increased inspections. Instead, it's crunched the numbers and determined that it's cheaper to cut power.

Here's what else is missing from the utility's impressive public relations blitz: had the shutoff plan been in place in 2007, it would not have prevented the 2007 firestorms. Cal Fire data shows that communities would have been shutoff from power *after* the start of the fires.

This is among the many reasons Cal Fire, the San Diego County Fire Chiefs Association, the San Diego County Sheriff's Department and the San Diego County Office of Emergency Services won't embrace the plan.

Sadly, SDG&E isn't the only entity in the region selling out residents. The *Union-Tribune* has reported sordid tales of SDG&E contractors and leaders of SDG&E-funded community groups failing to disclose financial ties to the utility while testifying in support of the shutoff plan before the CPUC.

The people opposed to the shutoff plan don't have the oil industry's millions to buy influence and manufacture a PR campaign. Still, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors, the San Diego County Office of Education, numerous water districts, telephone companies, cable television companies, people with disabilities, consumer protection groups and thousands of residents are united in our opposition to this poorly-crafted gamble.

August 11, 2009 - "The ALJ is right on and to be commended for seeing through SDG&E's expensive propaganda and recognizing that the current plan is an ill-crafted gamble that would put lives, property and businesses at great risk. The Simon proposal fails to address two critical questions that must be answered before any plan in implemented. First: whether shutting off power will result in a net reduction in wildfires. Second, whether the benefits of the shut-off outweigh the adverse impacts. As the ALJ rightfully and wisely warns, SDG&E has failed both tests."

August 20, 2009 "I applaud the CPUC's decision to put a stop to SDG&E's arrogant and unilateral attempt to implement its shut off plan prior to a formal decision by state regulators. This is a victory for public safety and a victory for opponents of this bad plan."

(June 8th Excerpt); Item 7b. Public Project Proposal. Stop Sign on Eucalyptus Drive, Crest. Chairperson Wally Riggs explained that Maria Rubio, County Traffic Advisory Committee, informed him that the existing stop sign that has been in place for many years at the corner of Eucalyptus Drive and Dehesa Mountain Lane, Crest, was originally installed without approval of the Board of Supervisors. The County is soliciting comments on this matter from the Planning Group before the July meeting of the Traffic Advisory Committee. Judy Bowen (Crest) moved that the Planning Group informs the Traffic Advisory Committee that it has no objection to the removal of the unauthorized stop sign at the intersection of Eucalyptus Drive and Dehesa Mountain Lane, Crest. The motion passed (10 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain).

(July 9th Excerpts)

Supervisor Diane Jacob has scheduled a meeting on 17 September to hold a community discussion about the possibility of the Rural Fire Protection District forming a joint fire station in Dehesa with the Sycuan Tribal Fire Department, which would provide full fire and emergency service the Dehesa-Harbison Canyon communities for a 3-year period. (The matter will be an item on the agenda of the October meeting of the Planning Group.)

Item 6a. Private Project Proposal. TPM 21164, Proposed 4 Lot and Remainder Parcel Split, 1970 La Cresta Road, Crest. Chairperson Riggs introduced the parcel owner and applicant, Stan Harper, and reviewed the application to split an 11-acre parcel into 5 lots, each at least 2 acres. Two existing dwellings will be retained; all lots will be served municipal water; an existing well on Lot 2 will be retained for irrigation use only; all lots have passed septic percolation tests and will be served by septic systems with leach fields; the project is surrounded by 1-acre lots on one side and by some 2-acre lots on the opposite side; 31 adjacent neighbors have been notified of the proposed project and no objections have been received. Pat Ulm moved that the Planning Group recommends approval of TPM 21164 as proposed. The motion passed (12 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain).

Item 7a. Public Project Proposal. Planning Area Community Plan, 2020 General Plan Update. Chairperson Riggs informed the Group that the Draft Community Plan is available for a 60-day public review period beginning Monday, 29 June 2009, at the Department of Planning and Land Use web site. This draft Community Plan will be reviewed at the August meeting of the Planning Group.

Item 7b. Public Project Proposal. San Diego County Draft General Plan, Revised July 1, 2009. Chairperson Riggs informed the Group that the Draft General Plan and Draft Environmental Impact Report are available for a 60-day public review period beginning Monday, 29 July 2009, at the Department of Planning and Land Use web site. The Draft General Plan and Draft EIR will be reviewed at the August meeting of the Planning Group.

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About Crest... South Lane Park

When researching the background on South Lane Park, I found two different documents filed away in the archives of the Crest Historical Society describing its beginnings.



An article printed in the January 1998 Echos Newsletter (originally printed in the 1988 BACK COUNTRY TRADER by Ann Holton) stated:

"Originally, Suncrest Incorporated gave property to the Baptist Church for building a retirement home. The home was never built. The property reverted to the County who later sold it to a private party." On October 24, 1974 the Crest Civic Group wrote a letter to the County asking them to acquire this 10.5 acre site for a Crest Park."

This October 1974 letter was written by Kathryn Hawkins and John Darsey, of the Crest Civic Group Park Project to the County in an effort to initiate the project of obtaining the property for a community park. Excerpts from this letter elaborate the park's history with a little different spin:

"When the southern portion of the community, know as Suncrest, was developed in the early 1920's, that acreage was noted on the county assessor's map as Park and Recreation land, under the auspices of Suncrest Inc, membership comprised of property owners in Suncrest. In the early 1960's, apparently, because of the tax burden, the parcel was sold and passed into private ownership.

The property was not developed, however, and continued in use as open land. With the consent of the owner, it continued to be utilized as a park until sold recently. In 1968, the Crest Civic Group and local chapter of Equestrian Trails, Inc. jointly, built an arena and conducted horseshows, minibike rodeos, and other community and fund-raising activities which contributed to the unusual sense of identity and spirit of the Crest Community.

Many efforts have been made by The Crest Civic Group and by individuals to investigate how the land might be returned to public use. Apparently, the usual approach would be to form a tax assessment district. As the community was tragically stricken by the Laguna Fire of 1970, with 115 homes completely destroyed and with a consequent, drastic increase in real estate appraisal (following the upgrading of the area with new homes), most of the property owners are not receptive to the tax assessment solution. A more likely approach would seem to be through donation of the land to the County by an individual or a group...."

Additional information found in Ann Holton's article stated ..."It took four years before the property was included in the local Parks Implementation Program because the Park Land Dedication Ordinance fund for our local park planning area was insufficient to cover the acquisition costs. No federal or state grants were available as a supplement to that fund until 1978."

The article further states "...hearings were held from May 30, 1978 to March 14, 1979 until finally the property was acquired by the County for the sum of \$140,000 with the understanding was that no development would occur until both development and maintenance revenues were identified. On April 23, 1982, the Crest Civic Group officially name the park "South Lane County Park."

In 1984, The Crest Horse Group/E-Crestrians, Inc was granted a non exclusive use and occupancy permit for the five acres closest to South Lane. The group was required to pay utilities and maintain the property as needed.

Since 1984, the E-Crestrian group in conjunction with the county has maintained South Lane Park. In the past two years the Crest Fire Safe Council has been working to utilize South Lane Park additionally as a secondary disaster recovery center and large animal evacuation center.



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Critters in Crest Gray Fox

The gray fox, *Urocyon cinereoargenteus*, is unique among foxes in that it can climb trees (to avoid predators, and to prey on tree dwelling food), and, even acts cat-like at times. It is considered to be amongst the most primitive of the canids (foxes and dogs).

In coloration, they have grizzled upper parts, a strong looking neck and a black-tipped tail. The males are slightly smaller than the females and measure from 31½ to just over 41 inches in length. The tail can be 11 to 17½ inches long, and they weigh 8 to 15 pounds.

They mate for life, and in February to March each year, have one to seven kits. They have a gestation period of about 53 days. The kits can hunt for themselves after approximately 4 months of age and leave the parents when they reach sexual maturity in autumn. They range from southern Canada to northern South America. They are solitary hunters and omnivorous, eating rabbits, voles, shrews, birds and any fruit they can find.

I saw a pair of gray foxes raise a family at a Kearny Mesa plant (where I used to work) a couple of years in a row. They raised their kits in a storage tent and hunted in the surrounding open space, which included Montgomery Field and the open spaces surrounding I-15 (the Escondido Freeway). Another year, they raised kits under shipping containers, again, in the back lot of my previous employer. The following Photo is by John McCague.



I had asked for any sightings of foxes by Crest residents. Of those that my request reached, Chris Seebold came through. I got this from her about a year ago, but hadn't got around to it (this article) until now. Here's her account:

"... we have lived on the canyon rim overlooking Dehesa for over 20 years. Until about 6 or 7 years ago we had gray foxes on our property frequently.... They were wonderful to watch and interact with. They used to come up from the canyon below us in the evening right through our back yard... usually in pairs. One night my husband and I were sitting in a little spot down over the edge of the hill from our house where a previous owner had built a stone barbecue. We watched quietly as a pair of foxes came right up over the lip of the spot we were sitting, not 10 feet from us. We sat motionless as they paused for a moment, and then seeing we were no threat, they simply passed by us on their way up the hill to our back yard.

Another time, I was sitting on a boulder on the hillside eating my dinner of potatoes, onion, and eggs... A fox walked right underneath me, and paused, looking

up at me. For some unexplained reason, I threw him a bit of my food, and he snatched it right out of the air like a dog, and then walked along on his way.

Another time, my neighbor from across the road and I were talking in the early morning at the top of my driveway. We got quiet and still as we both noticed a fox with a rabbit hanging out of its mouth walking right up the road towards us. When he got close to us he turned and cut across the road through our property. The craziest of all was when we were sitting at a picnic table with another couple in our backyard. Our cat was lying in the grass. A fox walked right by the four of us, and the cat, without any hesitation or apparent fear. Our friend reached out his hand toward it like he thought he was going to pet it. It just kept on trotting by. We all just looked at each other and marveled. We had to check to see that we had indeed seen the same thing. The cat didn't even appear phased by it.

During this time there was an empty lot with scrub oak and native vegetation at the top of our street, (two doors up), and many times we would see baby foxes playing there and hunting rodents. There were other factors that made it a heavenly neighborhood for the foxes. Our neighbor across our road had an old wooden cabin behind their house that had been vacant for a few years, and the sub floor area was open. Two foxes had a den there and raised kits.

Across the road from that cabin a neighbor used to leave an egg out on his porch for the foxes to come eat in the evenings. My neighbor across the road tried it as well, and one of them came to her porch as well, and she was able to observe it eating. (Not a good idea if you raise chickens for their eggs. –ss)

Times change....my neighbors wanted to refurbish and rent the cabin, so when all the foxes were out one day, they boarded up the subfloor. The man who left an egg every evening moved, and the new people put a dog in their yard. The 'unbuildable' lot at the top of the hill was built on, and then there was the Cedar Fire. We have not seen them since.

That is the way it often is. When we moved onto this property in 87, we frequently saw many raccoons, and skunks as well as the foxes. Now we see more squirrels, so many so that it is almost impossible to grow any food. We also see lots of rabbits.

We did see bobcats twice after the Cedar Fire...



once in our courtyard. But that is a different story. (A story for another Critters article?).We share a love of all things wild.

And so do we Chris. Thank you for your story!


