Beat the Bully!!

Bullies are scary - to adults, to seniors and especially to our children. As a new school year begins, let's watch for the signs so that your child does not become a victim of bullying! Here are a few effective ways to protect your child at school. **Know the Types of Bullying**: Verbal, Social, Cyber and Physical. In the past, we have thought of bullying as Physical (hurting someone physically) however, over these past few years (most common reason for teen suicides) bullying has become Verbal, Social and Cyber.

Watch for Quiet or Silent Symptoms: Changes in behavior, recurring or excessive "illnesses" such as headaches, stomach aches, reluctance or refusal to attend school. Unusually hungry after school and eats the equivalent of a meal, they may be experiencing being "bullied" into relinquishing their lunch.

Listen and Take Action: Encourage your child to talk with you routinely about what happens at school. Respond to your child's anxiety or concerns with love and patience and never minimize their feelings. Keep a log of events that your child describes; include times, dates, locations and the nature of the bullying. Then, work with the school to develop an action plan. Crime Prevention Specialist Paula Dickenson, Alpine and East County Rural, provides information, brochures and presentations on "Bullying Hurts!" to all age groups, beginning at the K thru 6th grade level. Perinatal Massage encompasses a woman's three transitional stages of motherhood. Before conception, during pregnancy and after birth, massage can regulate hormones and in turn reduce stress which can increase the chances of getting pregnant. It also can help release tension in the low back and uterus opening up a woman's womb and preparing the fibers of the uterus for the next stage, pregnancy. Massage can do wonders not only to the mother to be but also the growing fetus. Studies are showing that massage during pregnancy ensures the proper balance between both fore and hind brains reducing the chances of a child being born with overactive stress responses to situations and environment. For Mom. massage during pregnancy aids in overall emotional and physical well being. Emotionally, comforting touch while pregnant prepares and supports the comfort and nurturing energy Mom will provide for baby. Massage helps increase bonding in this way. Studies are linking the way we bring our children in to the world and their temperament as they grow. Since memory storing starts as early as a fetus in the womb, labor massage greatly promotes a calming and nurturing energy and can greatly assist in creating a more relaxing environment baby will benefit from. This stage can be viewed as the most important being as it is the first introduction baby has into his/her new world. After birth, postpartum massage can do wonders in the healing process that occurs after a new mother has given birth. By increasing circulation and reducing stress hormones, massage can help increase the flow of mothers milk. Breastfeeding is a different experience for each Mom and sometimes a little help can go a long way. There are also wonderful techniques that can aid in the recovery of Mom's new tummy, helping return the abdominal muscles to their proper placement as best as possible. For a new Mom who experienced a cesarean birth, massage after the healing process of the incision area can help relax muscle fibers, heal scar tissue and foster abdominal strengthening. 
Fire Protection News:

Crest Fire Safe Council: This year Crest Fire Safe Council has once again been awarded a \$2,500 grant for emergency items needed for Crest and

surrounding communities. At the 4th of July festivities, CFSC met and joined forces with the Amateur Ham Radio Club of El Cajon. After many discussions and attending a couple of their meetings, it was discussed that the repeater which is 40 years old and sitting atop the Crest water tank, is not dependable and needs to be replaced. CFSC has decided to purchase the equipment and donate the repeater to the club. This repeater will be able to service not only Crest but El Cajon, La Mesa, Spring Valley, parts of Lakeside, and Harbinson Canyon. Having this repeater up, will be an integral part of the Crest emergency communication system. The Ham Radio club has also offered to be a member of the Crest Community Association and to help the Crest CERT team as well as the CFSC in setting up an incident command center. We are lucky here in Crest to have them as well as Pat Bunshold, our own Crest resident who installed the ham station in the clubhouse.

CFSC would also like to mention that it is really time to check your "to go" bag for evacuation and to make sure that the council has the up to date numbers for you. Remember that we can reach your home, cell, and work numbers all within 7 minutes, and this service is FREE!! If you have any questions talk with your neighbors who get the calls or emails, I think you will be pleasantly surprised. If you have a computer, you may email your information to: kandhyfranklin@cox.net.

For the last 3 years, you will notice that the fire break is being maintained. This work is being done by Johnny Gonzales and his goats. His company is: Environmental Land Management. They use men, machines and goats. You may reach him at 619-234-4555. CFSC is working on a grant for the rest of that east and south side of Crest. The link below is to the Cuyamaca College, Continuing Education, preview classes in Food & Wine. The school is offering Your First Vineyard, Parts 1 & 2, and General Viticulture Parts 1 & 2. Each part is a six week class. There are also 2 single night wine tasting classes.

There is a bit of growth spurt in the county in grapes for wine and in wineries. The county recently updated its zoning to allow small "boutique" wineries and tasting rooms in areas that were zoned strictly for agriculture or rural, which precludes opening a business or processing facility, unless a "Major" land use permit application is made, which can costs hundreds of thousands. With the new ordinance, the process is simplified and size limits set for wineries and tasting rooms. There are now over 20 in Ramona, about 4 or 5 in the east county hills, over 50 growers, and even Mt. Helix has a new vintners or growers organization.

The school began offering classes this year and has seen strong enrollment.

Badgers and Habitat Conservation

Crestridge ER and lands of several other EDI partners were included in a research project being coordinated by the US Geological Survey in San Diego County that seeks to better understand habitat connections and wildlife corridors by making observations about the presence and movement of badgers. Carlton Rochester of the USGS provided this summary:

"USGS - San Diego County Badger Surveys:

Badgers (Taxidea taxus) are wide-ranging mid-sized predators that are known to inhabit San Diego County. Like mountain lions, they are known to range over wide areas, often making movements of 10km or more per day. Therefore, they are a suitable focus species for monitoring regional-scale connectivity. Unlike mountain lions, they are more common in open or grassy areas, and thus are indicators for connectivity for a different suite of species. Their primary prey are small mammals such as rabbits and squirrels, which are more widely distributed than the mountain lion's primary prey, mule deer. However, we have little data on the movement and habitat use of badgers in San Diego County. The objective of this study is to identify badger locations in San Diego County using canine scent detection. This method is advantageous in that large areas can be surveyed in relatively little time for badger scat, giving us information on badger home range locations and habitat usage within the county. We hope to build upon this information in future years by analyzing badger movement using radio-telemetry techniques.

In coordination with the wildlife agencies and the SDMMP, USGS prioritized areas for badger occupancy surveys. Focal survey areas were in and around MSCP lands, but surveys extended across the county. The field surveys utilized an experienced scent detection canine and handler who were trained to detect badger scent/scat (Conservation Canines, University of Washington). GPS locations of each badger scent detection location, any burrows observed, and the habitat/vegetation community in the proximity of the detection location was recorded. Any scat detected was collected for potential future DNA or dietary analysis. In order to maximize effectiveness of the surveys, the canine was unleashed at times during the surveys under complete voice control with the handler." 


The Following are segments from the April 9 2012 minutes regarding Crest. For a full copy of the minutes go to www.crestplanning.org:

Item 3a. Open Forum.: David Richardson, Crest, spoke to the meeting about the Quail Bush natural gas power plant project proposed for construction at the intersection of Mast Blvd. and Highway 52 in Santee, at the edge of Mission Trails Regional Park. He discussed several negative impacts of the project to the community (i.e., air pollution source close to schools and Regional Park; air pollution contributions to Cajon Valley air basin and Crest; rezone conversion of Open Space to Industrial), and reported that the Santee City Council is unanimously opposed to it. The project would be located on Santee City property. He encouraged informed community opposition to the project

Judy Bowen moved that the Planning Group retracts its previous approval of the 2011- 2012 priority list for PLDO funding, and that it approves a new 2011-2012 priority list hat includes: 1) South Lane Park, construct a walking/jogging path through the park with circuit training stops; 2) Old Ironsides Park, install outdoor weight training station like Lindo Park currently has; 3) Nancy Jane Park, resurface tennis court; and 4) Recreation Programming Priority, after school programs at Nancy Jane Park for Elementary School and Junior High aged children. The motion passed (13 yes; 0 no; 0 abstain), Item 8. New Business. Implementation and maintenance discussion, and appointment of committee for official recognition of evacuation route to the west of Crest, utilizing Suncrest Truck Trail. Chairman Wally Riggs introduced David Richardson, resident of Crest, who is involved with community efforts to establish official recognition, to resolve access issues through existing gates, and to foster cooperative arrangements for the long term maintenance of Suncrest Truck Trail, so that it can serve the community as an effective emergency evacuation route to the west of Crest. David explained that the Endangered Habitats Conservancy will try to purchase the 47 acres owned by the City of El Cajon, and is willing to help maintain the road to its connection with Camino Monte Sombre. He thanked the Planning Group for its letter to the City of El Cajon Planning Department in support of the Suncrest Truck Trail evacuation route goal, and mentioned the letter encourages the City to consider selling its property to the Endangered Habitats Conservancy. David discussed other possible opportunities for strengthening community investment in Suncrest Truck Trail as an emergency evacuation route: the new CalFire Chief, Mr. Thom Porter is a potential ally in supporting the use of fees collected under authority of the Sate Fire Responsibility Act to help pay for upgrading Suncrest Truck 3 Trail to serve as part of the Regional Fire Plan; County Trails supporters should seek approval to use SRA funds for maintenance of trail elements that serve a fire prevention potential by providing access for firefighters and equipment to off road areas; South Lane Park could function as a hub in a Regional Fire Plan, providing space and support for evacuation of animals, parking and staging of equipment, vehicles, etc.. David recommended that the Planning Group establishes members to act as liaisons to the Crest Community Association, to monitor and track its planning for a Model Fire Prevention Plan for the trails, parks, open space and residential areas of Crest. Pat Ulm commented on the Planning Group's long-standing support for improving South Lane Park in coordination with creating a functional emergency, evacuation and fire response staging center for the Crest community. Chairman Riggs appointed the Planning Group members from Crest to serve as an Ad Hoc Committee to be involved with the Crest community planning efforts to create a Model Fire Prevention Plan, including the Suncrest Truck Trail evacuation route, and to keep the Planning Group informed of fire response planning progress.

The following is segments from the May 14, 2012 minutes regarding Crest:

In eighteen months (November 2013) the Ordinance for closing Camino Monte Sombre at Suncrest Truck Trail will expire, and it will not be renewed for a 7th time;
The Board of Supervisors will conduct a hearing at 10 AM, Wednesday, May 16, to review the State Responsibility Area fire prevention \$150 assessment fee, which Supervisor Jacob opposes as a "triple fire tax." Judy Bowen announced that Fire Chief Augie Ghio was injured in a motorcycle accident, and he will be unable to participate in immediate negotiations and planning for the Suncrest Truck Trail emergency evacuation route. Item 7. Unfinished Business. Evacuation route to the west of Crest, utilizing Suncrest Truck Trail. David Richardson, Crest resident, reported that at the recent meeting sponsored by Supervisor Jacob concerning the Suncrest Truck Trail emergency evacuation route, Fire Chief Augie Ghio volunteered to correspond with the property owner who controls a gate where the truck trail crosses his property, and that Ghio did send a letter about this. David also reported that the County Trails Coordinator, MaryAnne ????, considers all County trails to be de facto fire breaks, and part of the Strategic Access Plans for all regions; and that the County may possibly be able to use State Responsibility Area assessment funds to help with maintenance of County trails.



If you have looked at other rental facilities for a wedding/event you will find the Crest Clubhouse is extremely competitive especially if you are a member of the Crest Community Association. As a CCA member the pricing structure is as follows:

- 6 hour Rental: \$175 (\$15 each additional hour until 10 pm)
- The security and cleaning deposit is \$250. This
 money will be returned if the clubhouse is clean and
 free of damage at the end of the event.
- Private insure is required in the amount of \$1,000,000. Note this is standard for all rental facilities. The clubhouse has insurance for clubhouse sanctioned events but not private events. Event insurance can be acquired either by asking for a rider from your homeowner insurance company or you can Google "event insurance" and find many online companies willing to help you out. The cost typically runs around \$100 \$150 depending if you are serving alcohol or not. Depending on your homeowner's coverage, some companies provide a rider for free.
- You must be a member of the CCA to receive these rates. If you are a Crest resident you can join for as little as \$12 if you are senior, \$35 as a family or \$50 as a business member.
- This price includes use of the "warming kitchen", 13
 6 ft tables and 80 chairs.

There are also special pricing for small parties under 20 folks for 2-3 hours for afternoon showers, etc at an hourly rate, but this does not apply for weekend or evening rentals for parties, etc. See
